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THE RECTOR'S MESSAGE

AGAZINES, as you know, have to be prepared some time before they reach the hands and eyes of their readers, and I am therefore writing what should be an Eastertide message to you towards the end of Passion Week. I hope that Easter will have brought to all of you that joy in the Lord which is ever the reward of a Lent well spent. I trust that our self-denial during Lent will have resulted in a good and generous Easter offering for the support of our well-beloved Church. And knowing our St Mary's people I feel that I can congratulate you on both these things, though, as I write, Easter is still in the future.

As I announced last month, I am taking a five months' leave of absence from the parish, with the generous consent of our Board of Trustees, in order to visit Japan: to be present at the fiftieth anniversary of the Nippon Sei Kokwai (the Japanese Holy Catholic Church) and to see something of the houses of the Fathers of the S.S.J.E. who are working there. In my absence, the work of the parish will be carried on by our regular staff of priests, Father Hoffman being in charge. He and the other clergy who remain here will, I know, be glad to assist any of you in any way they can. Please turn to them if you need advice or spiritual help. At least two priests will be in regular residence at St Mary's throughout the summer.

St Mary's Summer Home at Keyport, New Jersey will be open as usual this year. Three separate groups of vacationists will visit the Home, which will be ready for the reception of guests from July first to August nineteenth. Father Eckman will be the priestin-charge, assisted as usual by our faithful Sisters. It costs a good deal of money to run the Home which provides a brief but refreshing vacation for so many of our people who otherwise would not be able to escape from the hot city. May I suggest that before leaving for your own holidays, you send an offering (however small) for this work of which we are all so justly proud. Such contributions may be forwarded to the Treasurer of the Parish, or, if you prefer, to Father Eckman or to Sister Mary Virginia, S.H.N.

I am planning to take a camera with me to Japan, and I have hopes of securing some good photographs so that I may tell you all something of my adventures when we gather together again in the Fall. In the meantime, may we all have a blessed Eastertide and a happy Summer.

A S members of St Mary's we have reason to be proud of St Vincent's Guild, which consists of the boys and young men who serve at our altars both on Sundays and weekdays. Not only is their service at the altar accurate and reverent, but they are always ready to sacrifice their spare time and their own amusements, in order that some special service may be supplied with an adequate number of acolytes.

At the present time there is an urgent need for new servers' cassocks, both red and black. The Guild has recently increased in numbers; and although good care is taken of the supply of cassocks, and they are repaired as long as they will hold together, it sometimes happens that it is difficult or impossible to find a cassock of the right size for each server. Probably six more cassocks of each colour, in assorted sizes, would be needed to relieve the present shortage. If you would like to show your appreciation for the work of this guild in a tangible way, and are able to do so, would you please communicate with their chaplain, Father Hoffman?

WITH the May issue, AVE intends to celebrate with a Jubilee Number, since this will be the fiftieth appearance of our little magazine. The first number came out in January, 1932, and it has appeared regularly ever since, except for the summer months, which are combined in one issue. Most of the credit for the general style and attractiveness of the magazine should go to Father Dale, its first editor. Others have followed in his footsteps, until AVE has become a real part of the life of St Mary's.

Next month we hope to have special articles and pictures, and a distinctive cover. All this will mean a bit more expense than usual. No doubt some of our regular readers will be glad to help with this additional cost. The Editor will be grateful for any donation you may care to make.

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EVIDENTLY the Dramatic Society has something up its sleeve. There is something so intriguing about the notice which appeared on the editorial desk of AVE that it must be printed just as it stands, without the change of a comma.

"Dear Editor: I think a straight note is the best, above all I think it should not be too definite.

"The Dramatic Society is considering a Spring Program of a rather unusual kind. Several plays of a type quite different from any previously done by this Society (or any other Society for that matter) will be attempted. Your appearance on Wednesday, April 28th with unfettered imagination in St Joseph's Hall will be appreciated. Further notice will be contained in the Weekly Leaflet."

We are all agog. Shall we have Soviet melodrama, or an ancient masque, or a sur-realist tragedy, with an immense naked eye painted on the backdrop, or some subtle little comedy with the scene laid in the morgue—or what? Come on the 28th—if only out of curiosity. We are sure you will remain to applaud our talented company.

Afternoon tea will be served, and, as always, the women of the parish, whether they are members of the Guild or not, are cordially invited.

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• N Friday evening, April the ninth, the parish branch of the Woman's Auxiliary will meet in St Joseph's Hall at 8.15 p.m. Deaconess Edith Smith, who has been working under Bishop Jenkins in Nevada, will be the speaker.

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MANY of you have no doubt formed the habit of looking over the tract table at the back of the church when you come to mass, and purchasing a few of the tracts from time to time. It is surprising what a lot of information can be compressed into the brief compass of a tract. They have the further advantage that they can be read in your own free time at home, and then passed on to others who may need to know more of the Church and her ways. A very real missionary work can be accomplished by those who will undertake to distribute tracts among their friends, using discretion in their selection, and never forcing them on those who are not interested.

Unquestionably a certain number of tracts are taken from the table without being paid for. We regret this, but we are somewhat consoled by the reflection that those who steal Bibles or Prayer Books or tracts may at last be converted by reading this pilfered literature. But there is another custom for which nothing good can be said, that of passing a half hour or so reading various tracts and church magazines, and then returning them to the table, presumably to be sold to others in a shop-worn condition. The tract table is *not* a lending library. If you are curious to know what the author of a tract has to say, please first drop the proper coin in the box provided. Prices are plainly marked.

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D^{URING} Eastertide, that is, from the first Mass of Easter on Holy Saturday till First Vespers of Trinity Sunday, the *Regina Coeli* is said instead of the *Angelus* at the appointed times. The number of bells is usually different, too, to indicate this change—four single strokes and then nine, instead of three three's and nine. Since the words of the *Regina Coeli* may not be familiar to all of you, we are printing them here.

> Hail to thee, O Queen of heaven, alleluia; He whom thou wast meet to bare, alleluia, As He promised hath arisen, alleluia; Pour for us to Him thy prayer, alleluia.

Rejoice and be glad, O Virgin Mary, alleluia. For the Lord is risen indeed, alleluia.

Let us pray:

O GOD, who, by the resurrection of thy Son Jesus Christ, didst vouchsafe to give gladness unto the world: grant, we beseech thee, that we, being holpen by the prayers of the Virgin Mary, his Mother, may attain unto the joys of everlasting life. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

We brought to your attention in a former issue of AVE the work of the "Guides Committee" of the Forward Movement Commission. Two of these Guides, or tracts, have been already published and are for sale on the tract table—"Forward into all the World," a missionary tract, and "My Own Steps Forward," a little brochure on personal religion. The headquarters of the Commission, in Cincinnati, has just announced the publication of two more titles—"Christian Worship", a splendid presentation of the meaning of Christian devotion, with special reference to the Eucharist; and "Forward to a New Economic Order," a frank condemnation of the capitalistic system as it is at present constituted, and a call to all Christians to coöperate in finding something better. These two will shortly be for sale on the tract table, and we hope that they will find a wide sale.

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T will be of great interest to all of you to know that the Congress Committee of the Clerical Union is now laying definite plans for the next Catholic Congress. It is to be held here in New York in the latter part of October, 1938. Two features which have been settled on can be announced at this time. The Congress will open on a Wednesday evening with Choral Evensong and sermon at the Cathedral of St John the Divine. It will be closed with Solemn High Mass in Madison Square Garden on Sunday at eleven o'clock. This will enable working people, and especially men, to be present; and we hope to fill the Garden to overflowing. Although this Congress is a year and a half from now, we hope that you will keep it in your prayers. St Mary's may feel a personal interest in the work of preparation, since one of the clergy staff here is a member of the Congress Committee.

- BAPTISMS.—Sundays at 3 p.m., by arrangement with the clergy. Proper sponsors should be chosen, and the mother should be churchea.
- MARRIAGES are solemnized only after arrangement with the clergy and after three days' notice has been given. A certificate of Baptism should be produced by both parties. Those to be married should, if confirmed, receive Holy Communion. A nuptial Mass is suggested. It is against God's law to marry anyone divorced, as long as the other partner is living. Marriages are not solemnized during Lent, nor on Sundays or Christmas Day.
- SICK CALLS, Holy Unction and Communion of the Sick, on application to the clergy, in person, by telephone, or by post.
- BURIALS.—The clergy should always be consulted *before* any arrangements are made. The bodies of baptized persons may be brought to the Chantry of the church at any time before the day of the funeral. It is the usual custom at St Mary's to have the funeral service a requiem Mass.
- MUSIC.—Arrangements for music at weddings or funerals should be made directly with Mr Nold, the Director of Music.
