The first Sunday in October is Dedication Sunday. Let every friend and communicant of the parish rededicate himself to our Lord that day, that during the months to come God's grace may be poured out on us in ever-increasing measure.

New Jersey, all report having had a "wonderful time" at the Home this past summer. The season was indeed a full and happy one. Many innovations were introduced for the fuller pleasure and recreation of our people, and our hearty thanks go out to our good friends who made these things possible. We hope that next season will even surpass the past one. Keyport is an important work amongst us, and inasmuch as the parish spends a neat sum of money each year for expenses and upkeep, we hope that as time goes on our property can be developed into a real vacation and rest place for St Mary's people. Later on more notices will appear in AVE about Keyport and our needs there, and we hope that our generous friends will continue to help us in this important work.

THE Friday evening social gatherings in Saint Joseph's Hall which have been discontinued for some time will be resumed this season. It seems advisable, however, to plan to hold them regularly on the second and fourth Fridays of the month only, though it may well be on special occasions that we shall wish to have extra "get-togethers" on other Fridays in the month. These occasions will begin promptly at 8.15 with a hymn and brief devotions to be followed by a lecture or address. At the conclusion of this, light refreshments will be served and there will be opportunity for general conversation and social intercourse. We shall not conclude with Benediction in the church as formerly, for a fixed devotion of that character often seemed to make the time for "visiting" rather too brief. We plan, instead, to close with rather more informal devotions at about 10.30 or so. We urge our parishioners and friends to attend these "Friday evenings," for our getting acquainted one with another is not an unimportant part of parish life.

The first of these gatherings will take place on Friday, October eighth. The Father Rector will give a general talk on Japan, and this will be followed by a more detailed lecture on Friday evening, October twenty-second on some particular phase of Japanese life. The lectures will be illustrated.

POR some years past, St Mary's, as part of its missionary offering, has been responsible for the salary of the Reverend Clifford E. Barry Nobes, who has been working among the Igorots in the Mountain Province of the Philippines. Father Nobes is decidedly "our own" missioner, for he was brought up in this parish, and for many years served faithfully at the altar. He is now in this country, having returned for a well-deserved furlough after seven years of strenuous missionary work. He is also a delegate to the General Convention from the Missionary district of the Philippines.

We are therefore especially happy to announce that Father Nobes will be our special preacher at High Mass at 11 a.m. on Sunday, October twenty-fourth. Father Nobes will also speak to us in greater detail about his work at a special "Friday evening" in St Joseph's Hall, the date being October twenty-ninth, the hour 8.15 o'clock.

BEGINNING October first, Father Williams will no longer be available for confessions on Saturday afternoons as heretofore. Instead of this he will be found in his confessional on Wednesday afternoons from 4.30 to 5.30, and will continue to be available on Fridays from 7 to 8. The full schedule of confession hours will be found printed on page 122 of this number of AVE. Save on Mondays and Tuesdays a priest will be available for the sacrament of penance at regular times on every day of the week, and a priest can also be seen daily at 7.30 a.m. for the same purpose on application.

May we suggest to penitents that hours announced for the hearing of confessions are not as a rule suitable times for requesting lengthy conferences with the clergy outside the confessional. Such requests, if granted, usually mean that some other person whose time may be limited has to wait a long time in order to enter the confessional. It is better therefore to make arrangements for conference with the clergy by appointment at other than the regular confession hours.

THE General Convention of the Church, held once in every three years meets this year at Cincinnati, Ohio. The opening session is on Wednesday, October sixth and meetings will be continued for two weeks thereafter. Among important matters

to come before the present convention are included such vital subjects as the strengthening of the missionary work of the Church; the status and duties of our Presiding Bishop, with an election of that officer; legislation dealing with the Church's attitude towards marriage and divorce, and other equally vital matters. Our prayers should be offered that the convention may be guided aright and that its deliberations may be overruled for good by God's Holy Spirit. We suggest that all our people add daily to their devotions during the meetings of General Convention, the following collect from the Prayer Book:—

"Almighty and everlasting God, who by thy Holy Spirit didst preside in the Council of the blessed Apostles, and hast promised, through thy Son Jesus Christ, to be with thy Church to the end of the world; We beseech thee to be with the Council of thy Church now assembled in thy Name and Presence. Save them from error, ignorance, pride, and prejudice; and of thy great mercy vouchsafe, we beseech thee, so to direct, sanctify, and govern them in their work, by the mighty power of the Holy Ghost, that the comfortable Gospel of Christ may be truly preached, truly received, and truly followed, in all places, to the breaking down the kingdom of sin, Satan, and death; till at length the whole of thy dispersed sheep, being gathered into one fold, shall become partakers of everlasting life; through the merits and death of Jesus Christ our Saviour. Amen."

THE United Thank Offering of the Woman's Auxiliary is an important factor in enabling our missions to carry on their work. The offering is solemnly presented at a great Corporate Communion of the women of the Church held in connection with General Convention, and the money thus obtained goes directly to the support of some worth-while missionary work, or to pay the salary of some missioner working either in the domestic or foreign field. While a large part of this offering comes from the small coins collected in the "little blue boxes" which many Churchwomen keep in their homes, the offering is supplemented by direct gifts made through the various parish treasurers of the U.T.O.

At the Cincinnati Convention this year this thank-offering will be made at a great Corporate Communion to be held at 8 a.m. in the North Wing of the Music Hall on Thursday, October seventh. It was found necessary to hold the service there since none of our churches in Cincinnati is large enough to hold the women who will attend. Mrs William C. Dickey of this parish, who is the Treasurer of the U.T.O. of the Diocese of New York will be present and offer the gift of the women of the Diocese, including the offerings of the women of the Church of St Mary the Virgin. We feel sure that many of our readers will want to have a share in this offering. It is not too late. Please send what you can spare (whether large or small) at once to Mrs W. W. Raymond, 414 West 120th Street, New York City so that she can forward your offering to Mrs Dickey in Cincinnati.

At the same hour of the Corporate Communion and offering in Cincinnati, at the 9.30 Mass on Thursday, October seventh (which allows for the difference in time) the Father Rector will say a votive Mass for Missions, and all women who can do so are urged to come, make their communion, and pray for the missionary work of the Church.

SUNDAY, October third will be observed as our annual Feast of Dedication. It is a day when we especially thank God for the Church of St Mary the Virgin, for its material fabric and for all the parish has meant in our own lives and in the lives of all those who have worshipped here. It ought to be a Feast of Dedication in another sense also — a day in which we offer ourselves anew to the service of our Lord who has done so much for us.

The regular Winter Sunday schedule will be resumed on the Feast of Dedication with Low Masses at 7, 8 and 10 o'clock, and with a Missa Cantata at 9 o'clock. The latter Mass will mark the reopening of our Church School, and we hope that our boys and girls and young people will make a special effort to be on hand. We hope many good Communions will be made at that hour as well as at the other Masses. At 11 o'clock, the High Mass will be preceded by a Solemn Procession. The Father Rector will preach a brief sermon, and will also give the instruction at Evensong and Benediction at 8 o'clock. May our Dedication Sunday be a good beginning to a dedicated year at St Mary's.

THE well-known "little bird" has whispered in our ear that our congregations would value the opportunity to sing more hymns if they had the chance. With this thought in view we plan to start our Evensong on Sunday evenings with three hymns, selected especially for congregational singing. Likewise we shall add an opening hymn at High Mass on Sundays chosen with the same end in view. The "little bird", alas, does not always tell the truth, but we hope that this time at least he is veracious, and we are looking forward to a burst of song from St Mary's congregation.

THIS year especially, when "wars and rumours of war" fill the air and the pages of our newspapers, we need to take to our hearts the message that the Feast of our Lord Jesus Christ the King is intended to bring to us. The festival will be observed at St Mary's on the last Sunday in October, the thirty-first. Let our prayers on that day be that justice and peace may both prevail on earth.

Solemn Evensong on that Sunday will mark the beginning of the great Feast of All Saints. We hope to observe this in some special way, and of course the Feast Day itself will be marked by a High Mass. Full details of this will appear in November AVE.

THE Living Rosary Sodality will have its October devotional meeting in the Lady Chapel on October eighth at 8.15 p.m. This will be followed by an informal meeting and social hour in St Joseph's Hall. All interested, whether members of the Sodality or not, are invited to be present.

As Thursday, October seventh is the traditional Feast of the Holy Rosary, the 8 a.m. Mass of that day will be of the feast, and members of the Sodality should try to be present and make a Corporate Communion.

Mary's Guild will have their first business meeting of this season on Wednesday, October 6th, at 10.30 a.m. A Corporate Communion of the members will precede the meeting at the 9.30 Mass.

This Guild is the oldest guild in the parish. It does an invaluable work in making and repairing vestments for the parish and for deserving missions as well. Women who can sew are especially needed in the Guild, but all who are interested are cordially invited to attend this first meeting when plans for the winter's work will be discussed.

R Ernest White, our new organist, began his duties at St Mary's the first of September. We are glad to welcome him to our parish and to express the hope that he will find his new work and association altogether congenial.

Mr White is a Canadian by birth and was on the faculty of the Toronto Conservatory for five years before coming to this country to study with the late Lynnwood Farnam, also a Canadian. Eventually he became organist of St James' Church, Philadelphia and, since 1935, has been head of the music department of Bard College (formerly St Stephen's College).

Mr White is a brilliant recitalist and has been heard in many parts of this country and Canada. Our parishioners will recall with pleasure the programs he played at St Mary's several seasons ago and will be gratified to learn of the forthcoming series of four Monday evening recitals — October 4, 11, 18 and 25 at 8.30. There will be no admittance fee nor will tickets be required but a collection will be taken to cover expenses, any balance to be turned over to the Rector's Fund. Those to be married should, if confirmed, receive Holy Communion. A nuptial Mass is suggested. It is against God's law to marry anyone divorced, as long as the other partner is living. Marriages are not solemnized during Lent, nor on Sundays or Christmas Day.
- Sick Calls, Holy Unction and Communion of the Sick, on application to the clergy, in person, by telephone, or by post.
- Burials.—The clergy should always be consulted before any arrangements are made. The bodies of baptized persons may be brought to the Chantry of the church at any time before the day of the funeral. It is the usual custom at St Mary's to have the funeral service a requiem Mass.
- Music.—Arrangements for music at weddings or funerals should be made directly with Mr Nold, the Director of Music.
