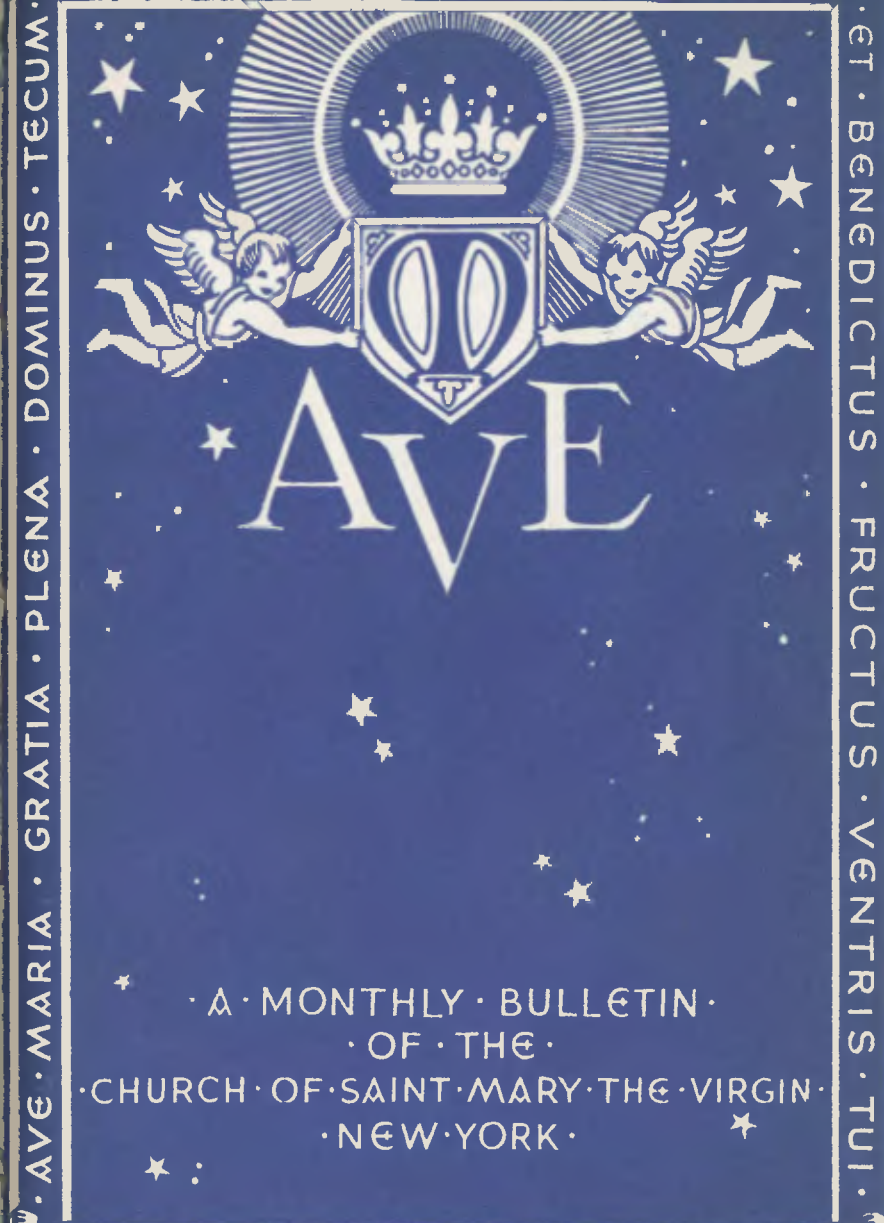
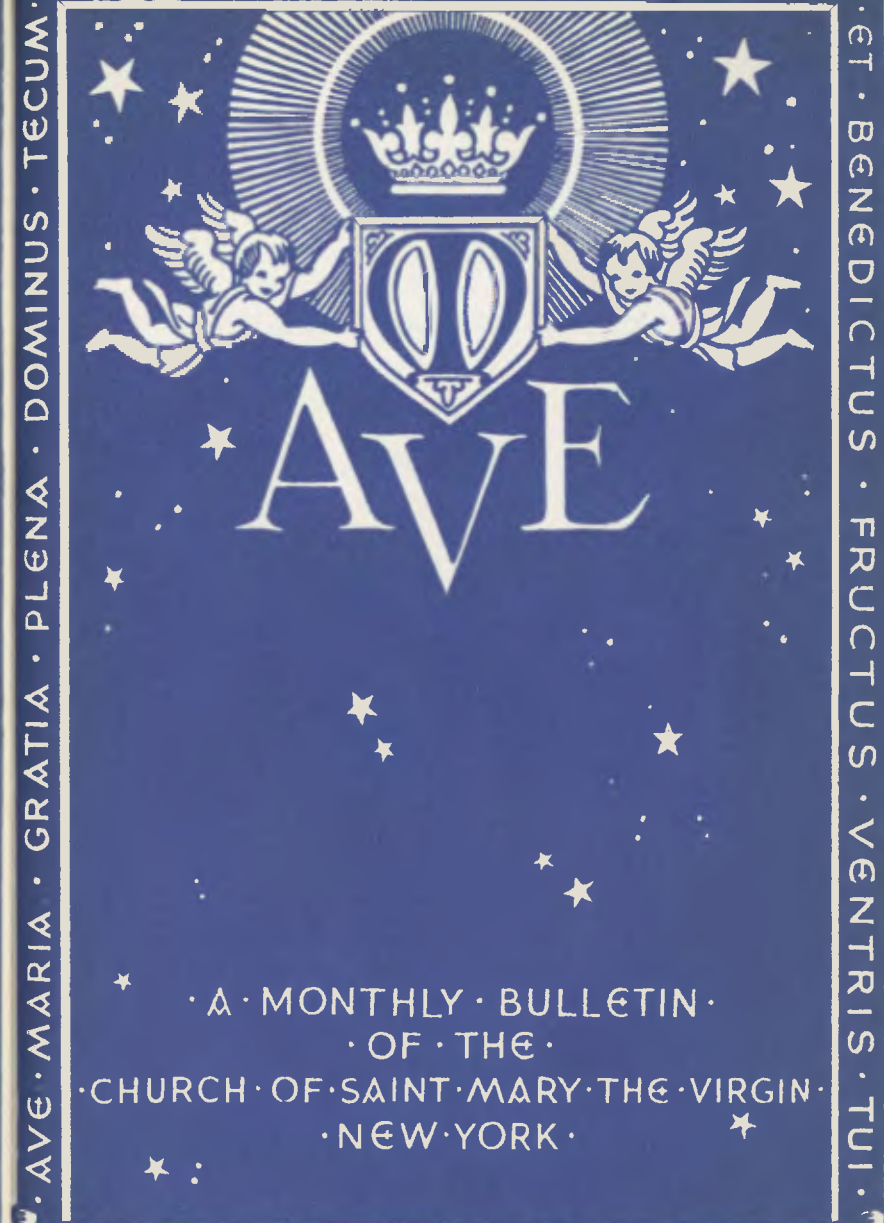

Dear Parishioners of St Mary's:

The beginning of a new rectorate is a more or less trying time in the life of any parish. The new rector does not yet know the sheep in his flock, and it seems to him as if he were in a sense marking time until a better knowledge of the sheep enables him to be a more effective shepherd. Then, too, the members of the parish wonder what changes the new rector will make, or what will be his program. I want you all to know how very helpful you have been in your warm welcome to me and your great readiness in making yourselves known. I also want you to know that no changes of any import will be made (though from time to time slight changes may be necessary to meet our present situation or our growing needs) and that I have no program save that of the Catholic Religion in the Episcopal Church.

As St Mary's has had a great past, so she will have a great future if her members are generous with their time and strength in the worship of Almighty God; if the Sacraments of Holy Penance and Holy Communion are frequently received and with honest preparation; and if the work of the Church Catholic here and in the mission field is loyally supported by offerings and prayers.

As time goes on, we must minister to an increasing number of souls. Let us not be selfish, rejoicing in our spiritual privileges

and allowing the matter to rest there. There are men and women and boys and girls whom we meet from time to time who know little or nothing of the love of Christ and who would welcome an invitation to attend worship here at St Mary's. In Christ's dear name, invite such to come to our service. Better still, accompany such to church and help steer them through what at first seem to be the mazes of Catholic worship. Above all, be friendly and make all strangers feel very much at home in the St Mary's family.

By the time this copy of AVE reaches you Father Peabody will have left for his vacation. It was with difficulty that I could persuade him to take any vacation at all, since his loyalty to St Mary's made him wish to remain here during these days of readjustment. However, he remained at his post all during the summer months without any rest or change, and we are now happy that he can have a vacation. We shall welcome him home again the middle of November.

On All Saints' Day, Wednesday, November 1, a High Mass will be celebrated at seven a.m. at which time there should be many communions. On All Souls' Day, Thursday, November 2, there will be a High Mass of Requiem with sermon at eleven a.m. Both days are dear to Catholics the world over, and St Mary's altars should be thronged by the faithful.

I ask your patient forbearance in the necessary rearrangement and slight curtailment in our schedule of Masses and confession hours, owing to the reduced clergy staff. I am confident that you will on your part gladly make sacrifices to bring your own spiritual life into line with this new schedule.

May God bless you and keep you in His loving service.

WITH this number of AVE you will receive a slip of paper on which to write the names of those departed relatives and friends whom you especially wish to have commemorated on All Souls' Day. Please print, or write very plainly, these names (as a rule, not more than fifteen), and return as promptly as possible to the Secretary, 145 West 46th Street, New York City. It is important that the Secretary should have these lists in hand in good time, so that they may be prepared for the clergy before All Souls' Day, November the second. Further, it is customary to enclose an offering according to your means with the list of names you send in. These offerings will be applied to the missionary work of the general Church. Most of you will no doubt welcome this opportunity of making a little extra donation, but there may be some who honestly feel they cannot spare anything at this time. In that case, do not hesitate to send your list of names without any contribution.

In some parishes it is the custom to read the entire list of the faithful departed at the Masses on All Souls' Day, but with the growth of our parish, and the increase in the number of names sent in to be commemorated, this is no longer practicable. The combined lists of the departed will be placed on the altar during the Masses on November second and the priest and people will make the repose of their souls their Mass intention. Then the individual lists will be distributed among the various requiem Masses during the month of November, in accordance with the schedule printed below. The alphabetical designations apply not to the names of the departed, but to the names of the persons who send in the lists. For example, the list sent in, say, by Mrs Jones will be read on the day marked "J" on the following schedule. Note, further, that departed Bishops, Priests and Deacons will be commemorated at the eight o'clock Mass on Friday, November the third; Religious at seven o'clock on November the fourth; departed clergy and parishioners of St Mary's

at eight o'clock on Monday, November the twentieth, and names enrolled in the Chantry Book at eight o'clock on Tuesday, November the twenty-eighth.

BY proclamations of the President of the United States and the Governor of New York, Thanksgiving Day will be observed this year on Thursday, November twenty-third. Much of the lack of joy in our religion is on account of our own lack of gratitude for the many blessings graciously bestowed on us by a most merciful and patient God. Surely, we Catholic Christians will make a great effort to receive Holy Communion at one of the Low Masses on Thanksgiving Day which will be celebrated at seven and eight. It would mean much if, as a parish family, we could all gather together for a great High Mass of Thanksgiving at eleven at which time Father Taber will give a brief address.

It is a fine custom here at St Mary's to bring Thanksgiving cheer to some of our own parishioners whose Thanksgiving must otherwise be just another day. Contributions towards this labor of love may be sent or handed to Father Taber.

ORGAN MUSIC

On the Monday evenings in November Ernest White will play four programs of organ music at St Mary's. This fall the recitals are built around the chorale preludes of Bach and his fore-runners.

As a form of composition the chorale prelude grew from the playing over of a tune before congregational singing. From the unadorned playing of the harmony, it was but an easy step to the making of slight additions, decorative or descriptive in character. The improvisation of explanatory settings for tunes was popular in France and Germany during the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries.

What began as a convention gradually emerged into an art form. A language developed with commonly used ideas being pictured by characteristic harmonic sequences and rhythms. Bach fell heir to this well developed musical language, and his poetic and sensitive settings proved to be a high point in this form. They are so, not because of his invention, but because of his skill in utilizing the work of his predecessors.

The November programs are of a varied nature, but each recital presents a group of the older chorale preludes together with some of the Bach preludes. The music is at eight-thirty, and no tickets are required.

A Priest can always be seen after any service.

BAPTISMS.—Sundays at 3 p.m., by arrangement with the clergy. Proper sponsors should be chosen, and the mother should be churched.

MARRIAGES are solemnized only after arrangement with the clergy and after three days' notice has been given. A certificate of Baptism should be produced by both parties. Those to be married should, if confirmed, receive Holy Communion. A nuptial Mass is suggested. It is against God's law to marry anyone divorced, as long as the other partner is living. Marriages are not solemnized during Lent, nor on Sundays or Christmas Day.

SICK CALLS, Holy Unction and Communion of the Sick, on application to the clergy, in person, by telephone, or by post.

BURIALS.—The clergy should always be consulted *before* any arrangements are made. The bodies of baptized persons may be brought to the Chantry of the church at any time before the day of the funeral. It is the usual custom at St Mary's to have the funeral service a requiem Mass.

MUSIC.—Arrangements for music at weddings or funerals should be made directly with Mr Nold, the Director of Music.
