Dear Parishioners of Saint Mary's:

We still recall Holy Week and the Easter Feast with heartfelt gratitude,—gratitude because we were privileged together to enter into the depth of the Passion of our Most Holy Redeemer and thus to be able to appreciate more fully the joy of the Resurrection. The Liturgy of Holy Church, adorned by her own proper music and ceremonial, carried us straight out of the confusion of this world right into the Sacred Heart where love alone is the symbol of victory. May the driving power of such spiritual blessings carry us to the heights in our Christian pilgrimage!

The Easter offering amounted to \$3910.72, an increase of nearly two hundred dollars over the Easter Offering of 1941. Of this total sum \$387.55 was contributed through our Lenten miteboxes. We should also report that to date \$161.20 has been given to the Army and Navy Commission and \$31.65 to the Presiding Bishop's Fund.

A new Honor Roll, on which are inscribed the names of our young men who have entered the service of our country, is posted in the vestibule of the church. We are proud of these men of Saint Mary's who are so cheerfully offering their all for the defense and spread of God-given liberties among the children of men. Their going forth from us has depleted our ranks in the Sanctuary, the choir, and the congregation. However, we shall try to carry on as fully as possible the best traditions of Saint Mary's, so that we may one glad day welcome back our men of the army and navy into their Church home in which there will have been as few changes as possible during the interval of the

war. May the sacrifices of those of us who remain at home be united with the sacrifices of those who have gone forth and may all our sacrifices be offered in union with the Sacrifice of the Lamb of Calvary!

REQUIESCAT IN PACE

N the evening of Easter Day Mother Matilda, Superior of the Sisters of the Holy Nativity, died suddenly at the Convent in Fond du Lac, Wisconsin. She had been with the Sisters throughout the day,—at the Easter Mass in the early morning in the Convent chapel, at dinner and at Recreation, reading aloud as usual and sharing in all the joyful Easter festivities. Then, as she was retiring, she passed quietly into life eternal,

Mother Matilda had for many years held office in the Community. She was appointed Mistress of Novices soon after her Profession, holding that office until 1920, in which year upon the death of Mother Katharine Edith she was chosen to be Mother Superior. Her installation in this office took place on the Feast of the Circumcision. She had been Mother Superior from that time until her death.

Mother Matilda was a woman of great strength of character and of winning personality. Gifted with remarkable energy and vitality, she used all her powers to the utmost, both for the Community's good and for the benefit of all who came within the reach of her influence. She never spared herself but willingly gave of her best to her Community and to the many souls who came to her for counsel. Her daughters and those others who have known and loved her know full well the tenderness of her heart and the unselfishness of her constant service.

May she rest in peace, and may light perpetual shine upon her!

TWO of the greatest of the Church's holy days occur this month,
— the Feast of the Ascension on Thursday, May the fourteenth, and the Feast of Pentecost on Sunday, May the twentyfourth.

"He ascended into heaven" we proclaim when we recite the Creed. Yes, Jesus Christ returned to His heavenly home which He left when He came to earth to become Incarnate in the human race. Home He returned to dwell in that spiritual universe surrounded by adoring angels and saints. In union with Him who is King of heaven we take up our heavenly citizenship. Indeed, we dare to end our prayers with "through Iesus Christ our Lord", knowing full well that we may pray by His merits which He constantly pleads before God the Father on our behalf. Jesus is our great High Priest in heaven just as He was our great High Priest on earth on Calvary's Cross. The Sacrifice of Calvary cannot be repeated since it has never ended. It is eternal. Forever and ever in heaven does our Blessed Lord plead the merits of His spotless life on behalf of our sin-stained lives. It is this eternal pleading of His merits that makes real the pleading of His merits in time whenever the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass is offered here on earth.

In a certain sense belief in the Ascension is the basis of our enthusiasm as Christians. We are not concerned with a Christ who is merely an historic figure in a more or less remote past, but we are rather concerned with a Christ who is exalted and reigning in His glorified humanity forever in heaven. At Christmastide our faith is strengthened by our recognition of Christ as having assumed our human nature that He might become our Elder Brother. At Eastertide our hope is raised by our recognition of Christ as having become victorious over death. At Ascensiontide our enthusiasm breaks all bounds by our recognition of Christ who is exalted to heaven and there reigns forever as King of kings and Lord of lords. And all the powers of evil can never destroy His rule in heaven any more than they could destroy His rule on Calvary where He reigned on the tree of the Cross.

Let us lift up our hearts, for while our ascended King was here on earth He said "In my Father's house are many mansions: if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto myself; that where I am, there ye may be also."

In the Creed we also proclaim "I believe in the Holy Ghost" and the Feast of Pentecost is the festival of the Holy Spirit. When we profess belief in the Holy Spirit we mean that we believe in the abiding presence of God in human life. This abiding presence is in individuals and in what is often referred to as the "Spiritguided" Church.

It is by the power of the Holy Spirit that we come to know ourselves as unforsaken, strengthened, and made holy by a Power not our own. As a favorite hymn puts it

"And every virtue we possess, And every victory won, And every thought of holiness Are His alone."

It is by the power of the Holy Ghost that we can confidently exclaim "If God be for us, who can be against us?" By His power we are gradually being turned from miserable sinners into happy saints. He helps us out of darkness into light, — out of the darkness of our own proud opinions into the light of the truth as it is in God. He convicts us through our consciences of our sins and at the same time gives us the strength and inspiration to turn from the desire for self-pleasing to the desire for doing the will of God.

It is by the power of the Holy Ghost, too, that the Church Catholic came into being and continues to do her work. Indeed, it is through the Holy Catholic Church that the Holy Spirit works. The members of the early Church were satisfied to live in the Spirit, but as time went on and the wisdom of the world began its attacks, the Church developed for her members a theology by the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Then, too, the Sacramental system of Holy Church with which all Catholics are familiar is effective only by the power of the Holy Spirit. We think of the Sacraments as those sure means by which the virtue and grace of the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ are vouchsafed to the souls of men. Yet the reality of the Sacraments depends upon God the Holy Ghost. It is the Holy Spirit who in Baptism gave you and me the new life of a regenerate soul. It is the Holy Spirit that makes the bread and wine in the Holy Mass to become the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. It is the Holy Spirit that confers Orders upon those seeking diaconate, priesthood or bishopric.

Two blessed festivals, Ascension and Pentecost! The former is complemented by the latter. We should associate with the Ascension the departure of God from the world were it not for Pentecost, which reminds us that the brightness and glory of the Divine Presence and the work of the Redeemer is an every-day fact, through the operation of the Holy Ghost. Thus our enthusiasm is an abiding enthusiasm for the eternal work of our heavenly King still continues in time.

N the evening of the Fifth Sunday after Easter Day, commonly called Rogation Sunday, May the tenth, at the regular eight o'clock service, the annual May Festival will be held. The service in honor of Our Lady, blessed Mary Ever-Virgin, will consist of Vespers of the Blessed Virgin, followed by a procession and the crowning of the statue of Our Lady. The evening will close with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. All will wish to be present to pay special honor to blessed Mary, Mother of God, in the month dedicated to her, the month of May. Those who honor the Mother honor the Divine Son!

N Wednesday, May the thirteenth, the Eve of the Feast of the Ascension, confessions will be heard as follows:

On Thursday, May the fourteenth, Ascension Day, there will be a High Mass with communions at seven o'clock. Low Masses will be celebrated at 8. 9:30, 11 and 12:10.

THERE will be a Corporate Communion for the members of the Fellowship of Saint John and the Associates of the Society of Saint John the Evangelist on Wednesday, May the sixth, the Feast of Saint John before the Latin Gate, at eight o'clock in the Lady Chapel. The various religious orders include an 'outer fringe' of secular associates who by their prayers, their alms, and their works hold up the hands of the professed monks or nuns. The associates keep a simple rule of life in addition to the normal Catholic rule of life. They gather together as occasion arises for Corporate Communions, Quiet Days and other devotions. Many of the congregation of Saint Mary's have identified themselves as associates of the different religious orders, thus furthering the consecrated work of the monks and the nuns who have taken upon themselves the life vows of poverty, chastity and obedience.

T the annual Parish Meeting held this year on Monday, April the thirteenth, the following were elected delegates to the Convention of the Diocese of New York: Messrs Howard I. N exquisitely beautiful chalice and paten have been given to Saint Mary's. These were used for the first time at High Mass on Quinquagesima Sunday. They are a memorial to Mrs Rosalie E. H. Tows, for many years a faithful communicant of Saint Mary's. They are given as a bequest in the will of Mrs Caroline J. S. Dean, also a communicant of Saint Mary's and a very close friend of Mrs Tows.

The chalice and paten were executed through the ecclesiastical department of Black, Starr and Gorham of New York City. The design of the chalice is inspired by the famous Celtic chalice known as the "Ardagh" chalice, made in either the ninth or the tenth century. The original is now part of the Royal Irish Academy collection in the Dublin Museum. That the Saint Mary's chalice might be really useful under present day conditions, the ancient chalice has not been slavishly copied. However, the design has closely adhered to the traditional expressions of the Celtic period, yet confining the decorative elements to small groups of ornament. The life everlasting is symbolized by an interlaced expression of ornament. The rope cresting, used much by the ancient Celts, also represents life eternal, for it symbolizes continuity and freedom from bondage. In the rope motif, one strand symbolizes Christ, while the other strand symbolizes man.

The Saint Mary's chalice is enriched with jewels, set in the Celtic cross at its base and also in the knop. The gold finish is what is known as "rich antique".

We are grateful indeed for this genuine addition to our Sacred Vessels which are in constant use. The souls of both the donor and the one in whose memory the gift is made will be remembered at our altars. "Rest eternal grant unto them, O Lord, and may light perpetual shine upon them."

N the evening of Thursday, May the twenty-first, at eightthirty, the Guild of Saint Mary of the Cross is presenting in Saint Joseph's Hall, an old-time minstrel show under the title "Red, White and Blue Minstrels".

The show, which promises to be a gay and colorful affair, follows the traditional form of the minstrel shows of the last century. The first part features the familiar by-play between the Interlocutor and the immortal End-men, Bones and Tambo. The second part features scenes and sketches, interspersed with musical interludes and specialities. To meet the needs of an all-woman cast two end-women, Lulu Belle and Lily White, have been invented.

There will be a few sketches and several ensemble musical numbers, including a Stephen Foster medley, a Gay Nineties medley, a Patriotic medley, and a medley of old-time songs. A Pony Ballet will be performed by the Guild's Beauty Chorus. A spectacular tambourine drill by the entire company will round out the entertainment.

Mrs Viola Sadowsky will play the Interlocutor; Mrs Marian Wilson will be Bones; Mrs Margaret Buffel will play Tambo. The two end-women, Lulu Belle and Lily White, will be played by Mrs Violet Blake and Mrs Maude Smith, respectively. Miss Margarita Collins will furnish the piano accompaniment. The proceeds from the sale of tickets, at fifty cents each (including tax), will go toward the maintenance of Saint Mary's Summer Home at Keyport.

THE annual service for the presentation of the Children's Lenten Missionary Mite-box Offering will be held at the Cathedral of Saint John the Divine on Saturday afternoon, May the twenty-third at two o'clock. Many representatives of the Saint Mary's Church School will attend. Bishop Manning expresses the hope that the entire nave of the Cathedral will be filled with children and their friends who wish to be present.

- BAPTISMS.—Sundays after High Mass by arrangement with the clergy. Proper sponsors should be chosen.
- Marriages are solemnized only after arrangement with the clergy and after three days' notice has been given. A certificate of Baptism should be produced by both parties. Those to be married should, if confirmed, receive Holy Communion. A nuptial Mass is suggested. It is against God's law to marry anyone divorced, as long as the other partner is living. Marriages are not solemnized during Lent, nor on Sundays or Christmas Day.
- SICK CALLS, Holy Unction and Communion of the Sick, on application to the clergy, in person, by telephone, or by post.
- Burials.—The clergy should always be consulted before any arrangements are made. The bodies of baptized persons may be brought to the Chantry of the church at any time before the day of the funeral. It is the usual custom at St Mary's to have the funeral service a requiem Mass.
- Music.—Arrangements for music at weddings or funerals should be made directly with Mr White, the Director of Music.
