Dear Parishioners of St Mary's -

A new Christian Year begins on the First Sunday in Advent, November the thirtieth. A new year suggests new resolutions. These should be incorporated into the Christian's Rule of Life. If you have not been living by a Rule, make one on November the thirtieth. Seek God's grace to fulfill it during the days of the coming Christian year. If you have been living by a Rule revise it on November the thirtieth in such a fashion as will challenge you to more generously answer the summons "Friend, come up higher".

Now the Rule of Life for each one of us should be sane, that is, it should call us to a slightly higher level of spiritual living than has been customary in the fulfilling of the three notable Christian duties,—prayer, fasting and almsgiving. The individual Christian's Rule should be definite and not vague. It should call for specific and not general spiritual activity. Most of all the Rule should be carried out solely for the purpose of responding to God's great love. If it is thus carried out, the keeper of the Rule will break its limits out of generosity to the good God Whose love is unbounded.

I therefore call upon each member of St Mary's to begin the new Christian year with a new Rule of Life. It should lift the devotional level of the spiritual life in its provisions for Holy Communion, Mass attendance, Confession, visits to the Blessed Sacrament, prayer, Bible and other spiritual reading, meditation, etc., etc. It should lift the disciplinary level of the spiritual life in its provisions for fasting, abstinence and regulation of eating, drinking, sleeping, talking, etc., etc., It should lift the almsgiving level of the spiritual life in its provisions for contributions to church and charity, visits to the sick and lonely, writing of letters, making of calls, etc., etc.,

FATHER TARER

I beg of you, do not formulate a Rule of Life calling for such spiritual living as that which St John the Beloved Disciple could have attained during the last year of his life upon earth. On the other hand, make certain that your Rule calls for a slightly higher standard of spiritual living than that which your past year's spiritual life reached. Then in God's Holy Name have fun in your Christian living. Break straight through the bounds of your Rule by doing more than the Rule calls for. God wants you to be buoyantly joyful and you will be if you leave in the discard all niggardliness in responding to God's love.

God bless you one and all in the new Christian year.

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### THOUGHTS ON PRAYER

### Its Necessity

**R**EMEMBER, God does not need us or our prayers. He is sufficient unto Himself, — three Persons in one Being, Father, Son and Holy Ghost. We, however, need Him for we are not self-sufficient, since our sufficiency is of God. Now prayer is the chief means of keeping our contact with God Whom we desperately need. Prayer is indeed our chief necessity in spite of the fact that many well-meaning souls act as though they believe that prayer is a pious luxury for doddering old fools and a sentimental exercise for little children. The fact remains that prayer is a *necessity* for all of the children of God of every age.

We all need to pray, indeed prayer is an obligation on all our parts because it is an act of homage which we owe to God. Poetry has been called "the perfect speech of man" but there is yet a better speech than poetry, namely, that of prayer and more especially silent prayer which is nothing less than homage in which the soul is caught up to God where it belongs. After all, He is the source of all for "in Him we live and move and have our being". Daily then we need to acknowledge our utter dependence on Him. Not just once each day, but at least twice each day, morning and evening, and seven times each day if we say the Breviary Offices do we adore, praise and thank the Giver of every good and perfect gift. When we pray at stated intervals we project ourselves in a real sense into the court of heaven there to join with heaven's gala company of saints and angels in their worship about the throne of God. When we say our prayers we honor the God of heaven and earth by specific acts of faith and hope and love. It is when we neglect prayer that we neglect the homage which we actually owe to God.

Then too we need to pray because prayer is the most important channel through which stream the grace and blessing of God. Our blessed Lord said "Ask and ye shall receive, seek and ye shall find, knock and it shall be opened unto you". When we really pray after the manner in which our Divine Saviour has taught us to pray, we busy ourselves asking and seeking and knocking and lo, the grace of God pours into our souls and the blessing of God streams from heaven into our spiritual lives. God does indeed love us and it is because He loves us that He delights to have us ask for His grace and blessing.

Let us never forget that life is a battle. This side of the grave we are in constant warfare. It is only on the other side of the grave that the warfare is ended. Yes, the battle is on and our common enemies are the world, the flesh and the devil. The world is wicked, at least so the papers tell us, and the worldlings darken our path though it leads to heaven. The flesh is tyrannical. The body insists on being our master. St Paul has so truly said "The flesh lusteth against the spirit and the spirit against the flesh and these are contrary the one to the other so that ye cannot do the things that ye would". The devil, a murderer from the beginning and the father of lies, sets many a trap in our way. Cohorts of evil angels join him in the fight against us. Indeed we cannot fight our common enemies single handed and so we must call on God for aid. If He is for us, who can be against us? God is omnipotent and we must pray for the victory in the battle which God alone can give. Actually prayer is our best defense in life's battle for prayer persevered in and serious habitual sin cannot exist together.

We came into very close contact with God in Christ when at our Baptism we were made members of His Mystical Body, the Church. It was then that we became branches of the Vine. This contact, however, stands ever in need of renewal. This is why our morning prayers are so necessary. The contact with God has been unconsciously broken during the night and stands in need of renewal the first thing in the morning. If we set forth about the work of

the day with no such renewal then we become prisoners of our own time and of our own surroundings. In other words we become provincial and not other-worldly, petty and not great. Almost without thinking we become submerged in our self-sufficiency and suffer the loss of spiritual stature through our own stupid pride. Yes, if we do not pray we lose contact with God and our love for Him. It is a truism that "that which is not expressed dies". Therefore we need to express in our prayers our love for God and our desire for union with Him. The age in which we live is one that for the most part spurns the God of ages of ages. Only men of prayer can turn back God's just anger against the world of today with its greed, its indifference to the spiritual, and its inhumanity to man. In this age, without spiritual depth it is impossible for man to realize his utter poverty and without faith it is impossible for him to have any hope or confidence in the future. Prayer it is that man needs, prayer that will help him to launch out into the deep and let down his net for the faith which alone can be the basis of his hope.

You see prayer opens the way to loving familiarity with God. The man of prayer is never alone. The man at his *prie dieu*, spiritually speaking, looks God in the face. No praying man looking God in the face says No to him and no man who has not the deliberate intention of saying No to God need ever fear to look Him in the face. Such is the situation because prayer is the animating and lively force that moves the soul to respond to the love of God. This is why prayer has been called the source of all spiritual progress and of all growth in holiness "without which no man can see the Lord".

Too, we need to pray since by prayer light is poured by God into our minds. We do need more than book learning for our minds. We need God's light. When once we receive this light through our prayers, then we gain a new perspective, we see all things in their rightful relationship, the eternal becomes everlastingly more important than the temporal, and first things are put first as we see that we were actually only chasing shadows and plunging ourselves into depression. With the man healed by our blessed Lord of his blindness we can exclaim "Whereas I was blind, now I see". WITH THE HOLY THOU SHALT BE HOLY

## St Francis Xavier 1506 - 1552

IN the season of Advent Christians have ever heralded the coming of the Messiah, yet in each and every age the Messiah has been far from being announced to all people. In the sixteenth century there sprang up by God's grace one who should be an Apostle to the Indies, blessed Francis Xavier. His missionary zeal was a shining beacon in an age of heresy, political intrigue, covetousness and false learning.

Francis was born of noble parents, taking the name of Xavier from his mother's family. When only seventeen years old he studied at the University of Paris where he subsequently lectured in logic and philosophy. Ignatius Loyola attended his lectures and was fascinated and charmed both by his personality and his brilliance in lecturing. Soon Ignatius won the friendship of Francis who became one of six to take Jesuit vows at Montmartre. He spent some time in Italy — more particularly in Rome.

Well did Francis Xavier know what a disciplined Christian life means. He ate no flesh meat, drank no wine, lived on coarse food and slept on the ground with a stone for his pillow. Indeed, he permitted himself but four hours of sleep each night and the remaining night was spent in prayer and visiting the sick who were keeping their long night watches. The constant companion of his austerity was holiness. He radiated sanctity.

Now King John of Portugal requested of the Jesuits that they send a missionary to the Indies. Francis was straightway chosen. In 1541 he sailed from Lisbon on a vessel having nine hundred souls aboard. Readily he made friends with the crew and with the passengers. The voyage took nearly eleven months and during this time he made up quarrels engaged in by those who had gotten on the nerves of others, nursed the sick, heard confessions, and Sunday by Sunday preached at a service held on the deck of the sailing vessel.

Finally Francis landed in Goa, India, where he set about converting thousands of natives. He always travelled about on foot and usually he went barefooted, wearing a torn cassock and a black cap on his head as a protection against the hot sun. He visited all the Portuguese settlements along the coast of India and then went East to the Celebes and Molucca Islands. Later he sailed to Japan in a frail Chinese junk. This voyage was so perilous that he was more than once nearly thrown overboard by the rough seas. During the twelve years he spent in Japan he received exceedingly brutal treatment. Once he was wounded with arrows, another time he was pelted with mud and still another time he was very nearly stoned to death. He remained constant to his crucified Lord all during his persecutions.

On leaving Japan Francis returned to India to strengthen the work of the Church he had planted there. Then he sailed for further missionary work in China, taking along with him an interpreter. They landed on the island of San Chan where Francis died of fever, thoroughly disappointed at not having reached his goal, namely, Canton, China. At the end of his earthly pilgrimage, he fixed his eyes on the Crucifix, his face alight with joy as he repeated over and over again the words of the *Te Deum* "In thee O Lord have I trusted, let me never be confounded".

Probably no saint in the Church's entire history has converted so many souls to Christ. The success of blessed Francis Xavier's work was due to God's abundant grace and to his own sensible methods. He had learned the varied and difficult languages of the Orient and so he could always preach with power and in the language best understood. At every mission station he always insisted on translating the Catechism, together with a few prayers and some hymns, into the native tongue. Then the children could be taught and with them Francis always left a native teacher while he continued the Church's message in the next mission station. Francis could often be seen going through the streets ringing a bell and followed by hosts of children. Indeed, he baptized all the children who answered the summons of the bell and on more than one occasion he baptized so many children that he could scarcely raise his hands from fatigue.

The natives in the Indies called Francis the "true father". With all of his spiritual depth, he was very practical and he gave full attention to the details of mission work and teaching and worship. Most of all he radiated joy wherever he went. Once he was observed walking in a garden on a moonlight night and as he walked he cried "No more, O Lord, no more". The joy that his Lord had given him was more than he could bear.

- BAPTISMS.—Sundays after High Mass by arrangements with the clergy. Proper sponsors should be chosen.
- MARRIAGES are solemnized only after arrangement with the clergy and after three days' notice has been given. A certificate of Baptism should be produced by both parties. Those to be married should, if confirmed, receive Holy Communion. A nuptial Mass is suggested. It is against God's law to marry anyone divorced, as long as the other partner is living.
- SICK CALLS.—Holy Unction and Communion of the Sick, on application to the clergy, in person, by telephone, or by post.
- BURIALS.—The clergy should always be consulted *before* any arrangements are made. The bodies of baptized persons may be brought to the Chantry of the church at any time before the day of the funeral. It is the usual custom at St Mary's to have the funeral service a requiem Mass.
- MUSIC.—Arrangements for music at weddings or funerals should be made directly with Mr White, the Director of Music.
