Dear Parishioners of St Mary's,-

The Founder and first Rector of our beloved parish, Father Brown of blessed memory, chose Our Lady as the Patron Saint of the parish and the Feast of the Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary as the Patronal Festival of the parish. Indeed, the first St Mary's on Forty-fifth Street was opened and dedicated on her parochial Patronal Feast, December the eighth, 1870, and the present church building in which it is our privilege to worship was opened with a High Mass on the Patronal Feast just twenty-five years later, December the eighth, 1895. The corner stone of our present church was laid on the Patronal Festival, December the eighth, 1894, just one year previous.

What a family day the Feast of the Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary is for us members of St Mary's as it comes around year by year! This year the Patronal Festival, December the eighth, falls on Wednesday. That morning at seven a High Mass with communions will be celebrated, followed by Low Masses at 8, 9:30 and 12:10, — all at the High Altar. As many of the parish family as possibly can should gather together at the High Mass to praise God for our untold blessings and privileges as communicants of the Church of St Mary the Virgin. Indeed, none should be absent.

The patronal feast of any parish may be kept with an Octave and therefore on the Sunday within the Octave, December the twelfth, we shall again gather together as a family at the High Mass at eleven to thank God for His care of us as a family. At this Mass Bishop DeWolfe of Long Island will preside and preach and, again, none should be absent.

No one will be absent who values his God-given graces and privileges and duties as a member of St Mary's part of the flock of Christ. You see our parish is a very sacred entity in the life of each one of us. It is a little section of the City of God, the Church Militant on earth, and the City of God here on earth is an outlying suburb, so to speak, of the true Heavenly City toward which we are journeying. Our journey as parishioners of St Mary's is ever a glorious adventure, and, if we remain faithful, it will lead us on into the glory of the true Church which is to be built up in heaven.

Will you join me at the High Mass of our Patronal Festival in giving humble and grateful thanks to Almighty God for the patronage and prayers of Our Lady, for the splendor of the dedicated lives of the members of St Mary's who have gone through the Gate of Death, for the obliteration of the ravages of sin in the lives of so many of St Mary's children, for the beauty of the worship of our Sanctuary which is a foreshadowing of the glory of the worship in the Eternal City, the heavenly Jerusalem? Remember December the eighth and the seven days following are special holy days for ALL of the members of the St Mary's family. Remember, and find yourselves before the altar in our treasured Sanctuary.

JOYFUL SPIRITUAL PROGRESS

In Worship

WHAT joy there is in worship! If we really worship, we are filled with joy simply because when we worship we get out of ourselves and give God His due, His worth, and He is due the best and worth the best and we are radiantly happy when we are giving our very best instead of clinging to and hoarding it. When we worship we are not first concerned about the formation of character in ourselves nor are we first concerned about disciplinary exercises nor are we even primarily seeking the means of our own sanctification. No, as worshippers our primary function is to praise and glorify God and to return in some small measure the love that He showers upon us even in our unworthiness. Our joy breaks forth into "we praise Thee, we bless Thee, we glorify Thee, we give thanks to Thee for Thy great glory."

Now after we have fulfilled the primary function of worship, and only after we have done so, can we have the joy of receiving from God the power for living as He would have us live. And what joy there is in this power which comes from Him who is all powerful!

There is the joy of the God-given power to become members one

of another. You see in our common worship we are a praying community. Indeed, the whole Mystical Body of Christ, the entire Church, prays with us. This living union one with another engenders the sanctity of each one of us as individuals for we become part of the "Communion of Saints." With joy we can exclaim with the Psalmist "Behold, how good and pleasant a thing it is, brethren, to dwell together in unity." As we worship together we realize that there is very little room for our individual prayers because our prayer is in common. Indeed, the minute we yield to the temptation to isolate ourselves and become "something special" in our worship, we recognize that we are immature and even mutilated individuals. As a result of such honest recognition we then refuse to shut ourselves up in the fortress of our own egotism - me and God — and we are happy in being and acting just as members of a great congregation. God has given us the power to become members one of another and in this power is joy beyond description.

There is also joy in the God-given power to grow in reverence. What is reverence? It is the real discovery of our true relationship with Him who is above and who speaks from above - our God and our All. When we grow in reverence we happily become capable of genuine enthusiasm in our religion. After all, lack of reverence springs from pride when we think of ourselves as greater than everything and everyone not ourselves and then everything and everyone, including God, are reduced to dead level. However, as we really worship we grow in the spirit of reverence for we are placing the highest value upon God and upon genuine adoration of Him. We are not permitted any feeling of self-complacency since we address our Heavenly Father through Him in whom He is so well pleased, namely, His divine Son Jesus Christ. We plead the Holy Mass in union with Jesus as He re-pleads His Sacrifice on the Cross before the Father and we customarily end our poor prayers with "through Jesus Christ our Lord." We know our proper relationship with God the Father and we are reverent and we experience the joy that accompanies true reverence as self-love is left in the discard.

Then too there is joy in the God-given power to become spiritually awake. In our own worship we learn to lift up our hearts. We learn also the answer to the question "Who art Thou and who am I?" Indeed, in our worship together we are drawn away from the grip of our personal interests and worries, whether trivial or great, into union with God, the All-Important. We are withdrawn

too from that deadening process of daily becoming dull in life's humdrum order. We are carried out of the darkness of the world into the light that streams from heaven. Indeed, time itself is made holy for us as each day of the full Catholic Kalendar includes the commemoration of some act of the all-holy God or of the life of one of His family who has reflected some of His holiness. The round of Christian worship is truly a joyful round.

Our Incarnate Lord has laid down many principles for the happiness of His followers. One of these is "Give and it shall be given unto you." Thus, in our own worship we give to God praise and adoration and we receive the grace and power to become one in Christ and to grow in reverence and to become awake spiritually. Can any joy be greater?

WHAT ABOUT GOD? (3)

WE shall have a good deal more to say about the infinity of God as we go along enumerating and describing His attributes. But let us leave it aside for a moment and take up the next term of our definition, His self-sufficiency. This term, self-sufficient, means exactly what it says in the most complete and perfect way. We often say that a man or woman is self-sufficient and it's usually an uncomplimentary remark meaning that he has as little as possible to do with his fellow beings. He is probably unfriendly and selfish and snobbish, or else he is afraid of other people, and this makes him act that way. But at the same time we know that nobody is really self-sufficient. In the first place, everybody had a beginning. And in the second place, somebody else was responsible for that beginning and for bringing him up and caring for him until he was grown. And in the third place, nobody, not even a Robinson Crusoe, is able to live and to love and to attain heaven without depending in some degree upon other people and other things, and most of all upon God.

But none of this is true about God. He really is self-sufficient. God is not dependent in any way on anything or anybody apart from Himself for His existence, His being, His life, knowledge, love, etc., or any other quality, power or attribute that may be ascribed to Him. He is not dependent on the angels, or on the world; above all He is not dependent on us or on any relationship with us or them for anything that He is or does. This is not to say that He may not or does not have a relationship with us or with

any other being external to Himself, that is, with His creatures. But it is to say that He does not need such relationships and does not in any way depend on them. He would still be all that He is if nothing external to Himself ever existed.

He is the ground or basis of His own being. And since that Being is infinite, He must be the cause of all other beings. Would it be right, then, to say that He is His own cause, the cause of His own being? No, it wouldn't. Because that would be to say that before He existed, He decided to make Himself, which is nonsense. Nonsense on two counts: for in the first place, since He is infinite, there is no "before" He existed; and in the second place, it would be saying that He existed and didn't exist at the same time — which is just as foolish as it sounds. No, He is not caused by anything, not even by Himself. He just is.

Though God is not His own cause, He is the cause of everything else that exists. If finite things exist, they owe it to Him. Now this is not immediately evident to us because we don't see God in the process of causing things. As a matter of fact, though He can, God seldom makes things directly. He uses tools and materials as all workmen do. When you see a handsome carved chair, you may say, "John Jones, the cabinet-maker, made that," but at the same time you know perfectly well that Jones didn't break the wood over his knee to shape the seat and the legs, but used a saw and a plane; and he didn't do the carving with his teeth, but used a chisel. Still less did he create the wood, or the iron from which the screws are made. But here is the difference, that while God uses tools and materials, He did create them too as well as the finished product. Everything in this world, including John Jones and you and me, was created or brought into being by something else; and that something else was created by something further; and so on back until you come to the point where the only answer that can be given is that this thing was created directly by God. So that ultimately the whole system of tools and materials and creative activity is dependent on God. God alone is self-sufficient and depends on nobody and nothing else. This is the reason why He is sometimes called the First Cause, or the Uncaused Cause, for everything else that exists ultimately depends for its very existence as well as its form upon God.

And here is the point at which we look ahead to the next term of our definition. Having considered this system of creative activity about you, can you possibly imagine its being brought into existence by an impersonal automaton, a blind and unreasoning force? I doubt very much that you can.

- BAPTISMS.—Sundays after High Mass by arrangements with the clergy. Proper sponsors should be chosen.
- MARRIAGES are solemnized only after arrangement with the clergy and after three days' notice has been given. A certificate of Baptism should be produced by both parties. Those to be married should, if confirmed, receive Holy Communion. A nuptial Mass is suggested. It is against God's law to marry anyone divorced, as long as the other partner is living.
- SICK CALLS.—Holy Unction and Communion of the Sick, on application to the clergy, in person, by telephone, or by post.
- BURIALS.—The clergy should always be consulted before any arrangements are made. The bodies of baptized persons may be brought to the Chantry of the church at any time before the day of the funeral. It is the usual custom of St Mary's to have the funeral service a requiem Mass.
- MUSIC.—Arrangements for music at weddings or funerals should be made directly with Mr White, the Director of Music.
