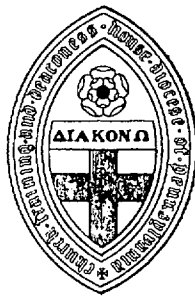
The Prayer for Deaconesses.

Minutes of Annual Meeting

Held November 11, 1929

THE Thirty-ninth Annual Meeting of the Corporation of the Church Training and Deaconess House was held at the Church Training and Deaconess House on this date. Bishop Garland presided. Others present: The Warden, Ven. James F. Bullitt, Deaconess Stewart, Deaconess Humphreys, Mrs. Perot, Mrs. Hill, Miss Frazier, Mrs. Page, Miss Ellen Morris, Miss Margaret Morris, Mrs. Van Pelt, Miss Sinkler, Mrs. Woodward, Miss Perot, Mrs. Fries, Deaconess Colesberry, Mrs. Browne, Miss Mockridge, Miss Mitchell, Miss Tilge, Miss Storrow, Miss Sachse and Mrs. Steel.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Bishop Garland. Reading of the minutes of the preceding meeting was dispensed with.

Deaconess Stewart presented the report of the Head Deaconess, which dealt with the changes in the officers and faculty of the school.

The annual report of the Board of Managers was read by Mrs. Page. Mrs. Van Pelt, Treasurer of the Board of Managers, read her report. Mr. Newbold's report as Treasurer of the School was presented. Both treasurers' reports were referred to the Warden and Mr. Sinkler for audit. The report of the Deaconess Retiring Fund was submitted. Miss Mockridge presented the report of the Associates. All these reports were referred to the Committee on Publication, Miss Sinkler, Deaconess Stewart and the Warden. Deaconess Stewart suggested the need of changing the date of Commencement, to prevent a conflict with a Convocation meeting. This matter

was referred to Deaconess Stewart, Miss Sinkler and the Warden with power to act.

The Committee on the restrictions on the rear of the property was continued with the same powers; but the present Warden was put in the place of Dr. Jefferys, the former Warden.

The following resolution was passed: That the President and Secretary be authorized to sign the order to satisfy presented by the Provident Trust Company in connection with the legacy of \$1,000 under the Will of Charlotte B. Lowber.

Report of the Board of Managers

AS THE report of the Head Deaconess will be very comprehensive, a few words from the Board of Managers will suffice.

Extensive and expensive repairs were necessary this year, such as repointing the chimneys, repairing the roofs, etc.

These have been attended to and the whole house is now in excellent condition.

Each year brings its changes in the personnel connected with the school, but we particularly regret that Dr. Edward M. Jefferys, in obeying doctor's orders, resigned as Professor, Chaplain and Warden. He had made himself much beloved, and it was hard to have him leave. The Bishop appointed the Ven. James F. Bullitt as Warden, and the Rev. A. A. Ewing as Chaplain.

Last winter it became evident that some changes in our courses would be advisable to meet certain demands of the churches and especially of the Sunday Schools. With this in view the Bishop appointed the Rev. F. E. Seymour Director of Curriculum, and he has brought our courses into line with what is now required of Sunday School teachers.

There is the change of one name among our Managers. To our great regret, Mrs. Samuel F. Houston resigned, after having served on the Board for eight years. Her unfailing interest and generosity will be greatly missed. In filling the vacancy on the Board, we felt that it would be mutually beneficial to the school and the Woman's Auxiliary to bring them into closer contact by having the place occupied, ex-officio, by the Diocesan President of the Woman's Auxiliary. Hence Mrs. George Woodward, the present President, was appointed and accepted the position.

The hospitality of the House has been extended to a large number of missionaries and others. In May an inspiring Institute on "Leadership" was held here, by Miss Mabel Lee Cooper, and the National Executive Committee of Deaconesses met here for two days. We have also taken as boarders some women who want to live in the religious atmosphere of the school while studying in Philadelphia. It is a cause of

satisfaction that the school has been increasingly useful, and that every room is occupied except those on fourth floor,¹ and that even in the summer when the school was closed, seventeen people sojourned at the House for longer or shorter periods.

Report of the Head Deaconess

TO THE BISHOPS AND CORPORATION OF THE CHURCH
TRAINING AND DEACONESS SCHOOL OF THE DIOCESE OF
PENNSYLVANIA:

The year has been full of many interesting events and developments in the work of the school. It has been a privilege to be here, associated with so many earnest people and permitted to carry out plans for the enlargement of the scope of our work.

The Household. During the last school year we numbered 23, divided as follows: Students 15, Deaconesses 2, Boarders 3, maids 3. This fall term we number 25 in all, there being two new boarders with us. Our new class of students seems satisfactory in preliminary training and experience, and to have a fine spirit in taking up the work here. Four of them had been teachers, the others business women, and one is the wife of a clergyman. We have had a total of 81 house guests during this year. That included Missionaries, Special Speakers (15 in all), Graduates, and personal friends. Some were here for one night only, while others were here for a few days or a week or more. We have had 304 guests for meals only. These included Clergy (after a service), Faculty, Managers, Associates, Graduates, and personal friends. We had in all seven special guest dinners when we entertained many friends of the school. Those are included in the above figure. The large group for the Alumnæ Luncheon is not included. The plan of allowing others besides the students to live in the house has justified itself to us. We feel they add to the general pleasantness of the family life, as well as being a source of additional

income. We have given to the Treasurer during this year \$1,257.63 from these extra guests, regular or occasional. During the months of July and August no meals were served here at the expense of the school. Those living here did cooperative housekeeping, and the school received room rent only.

Resignations. Three resignations have been accepted with great regret. The first was that of the Rev. E. M. Jefferys, S.T.D., from his three-fold office of Warden, Chaplain and Instructor. It seemed too great a blow to rally from, but it was under doctor's orders, due to the state of his health and his increased duties in St. Peter's Parish, hence we had to accept it. We realize that the best way to show our appreciation of his years of work in the school is to carry on in the same spirit of devotion and faithfulness that he had always shown. The second was that of the Rev. R. K. Yerkes, Ph.D., D.D. This came due to strain of regular work. For the last two years Dr. Yerkes had continued his classes while under a very heavy personal strain, and it seemed unkind to urge him further. We thank him for all he has done for us and are looking forward to his occasional lectures which he has promised to give to us. The third was that of Mr. H. L. Jefferys. He felt unable to give the time for the development of the course on Business Methods that we felt the needs of the students require. We are sorry, indeed, to lose him from our staff, and are grateful for the years of help already given.

New Appointments. In the spring Bishop Garland appointed the Rev. F. E. Seymour to the position of Director of Curriculum. This new office fills an important need in our work, and Mr. Seymour is without doubt the right man for it. His work as Diocesan Director of Religious Education brings him into broad contacts and we know he will see to it that our curriculum is kept up to the present day requirements. He

also brings our school into closer relationship with the Diocesan Normal School of which he is Principal. Very special thanks are due to him now for the thought and time he has spent on our course of study. He has already brought it to a standard of greater efficiency. The Ven. James F. Bullitt has assumed his new office of Warden, and the Rev. A. A. Ewing that of Chaplain. Dr. John H. Arnett has become our School Physician. Thus our needs are supplied and we are deeply grateful to these gentlemen who have so graciously accepted these responsibilities and additional work. (The new appointments to the Faculty are included in the next topic.)

New Schedule of Study. During the spring term Deaconess Humphreys taught a course in hand work and songs for use in weekday activities for Church schools. Miss Mabel Lee Cooper, National Secretary for Teacher Training, gave us an intensive course (ten hours) on "Leadership." Miss Mundelein led our students in two group discussions, the subjects being "The Negro and His Problem" and "World Peace." Mr. Seymour had an extra noonday class for some weeks on General History and Literature. The students conducted for themselves a short course in Readings from Famous Writers. During the summer three of our students had work in colleges. Miss Crossley obtained seven college credits in the Department of Religious Education in Teachers' College, New York, and has a teacher's certificate for one course under the National Department of Religious Education. Miss Janet Morris was granted a scholarship for part time study at Teachers' College, New York, and part time supervised work in a Daily Vacation Bible School. Miss Wilma Biggs has secured a U.T.O. Scholarship for Regular Teacher Training and is at the North Carolina College for Women for study. This fall the new courses added are: 1. Gymnasium work at

the Y.W.C.A., once each week at the students' expense. Some also take swimming on other days. 2. Bible Introduction, including an elementary survey of the contents, Biblical Geography, and the History of the English Bible. This is taught by Deaconess Humphreys. 3. History and Principles of Christian Missions. This includes the current year Mission Study text book, taught by Mrs. John Hill. Then the course on the subject to be taught by me. (I am taking the course at Temple University in preparation for the class.) It will also give credit for the various missionary lectures which we so frequently have the privilege of having given here. 4. Parish Administration. This is in the process of development. The first unit of ten hours is to be given next week in an intensive course taught by Miss Edna Beardsley, the Assistant National Executive Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, on "Women in the Parish." The second unit is to be a symposium given by various experienced parish workers (Deaconess Brookman, Miss Henk and others) on Methods of Parish Work, that is various organizations, records, etc. The third unit is Business Methods. Dr. Franklin, Treas. of the National Council will give us some lectures on this subject. The new members on the regular faculty are the Rev. B. N. Bird for the Book of Acts and the Epistles of St. Paul; the Rev. S. V. Wilcox for the O. T. subjects; the Rev. M. W. Sharp for Sociology. We are grateful to all these many new helpers in our work and we trust they will enjoy being a part of the school. We also feel very happy that Bishop Taitt has been able and willing to continue his work here.

Outside Contacts and Interests. Our students now have regular work at the Diocesan Normal School. We do not duplicate in our curriculum the subjects in Religious Education given there. Hence Mrs. John Loman, who for years

came faithfully to us, has our students in her classes there. Our students receive the N.A.T.A. Certificate before they receive our diploma. Many of our courses are, of course, much more detailed and thorough than those at the Normal School and others appreciate that fact. We have seven outside students coming to us for some classes. We have attended various Diocesan meetings: the Church School Annual Institute and Supper; The Diocesan Educational Day, and the Presentation of the U.T.O. Service of the Woman's Auxiliary; the Church Social Workers' Guild meetings and suppers; and the great and happy occasion of the consecration of Bp. Taitt. In the spring a new feature in practical work was tried. The Seniors, two by two, a week at a time, went into residence at St. Martha's House, coming back to us for class work only during their time there. It was thought that by living there when the work was at its height, they would get an insight into that type of work which occasional observation could not give. They were all most interested in the work and happy to have had that privilege. Another thing was that one of our students was admitted to two classes for regular work, one in Theory, and one in Demonstration, of Nursing, with the class of probationers at the Pennsylvania Hospital. We are very grateful to Miss Dunlop for making that possible. Miss Alley had a number of courses at Temple University in the spring, and Miss Keller has a heavy schedule of work there this fall.

Repairs and Equipment. Much has been done this year to improve our building. During the Easter vacation the kitchen was completely redone, and fine new linoleum (the gift of Mrs. Browne) was laid. During the summer, eleven bed-rooms were papered and most of them painted (through the help of Miss Sinkler and Miss Morris). The parlor,

Chapel and dining room floors were refinished, the chimneys and roofs repaired, and a new roof put on the garage; the electric lights were repaired and new ones installed in some parts of the house; and in the spring a Thermovent attachment for the furnace, being regulated by a thermostat, was a great improvement to the heating system. All these have added much to the appearance and comfort of the House and have, of course, added much to the expenditures for the year.

Class of 1929. Seven students were graduated on May 28th. These were: Miss Mildred Alley, of Maine, now the Diocesan Director of Religious Education in North Dakota; Miss Wilma Biggs, of North Carolina, now studying in the N. C. College for Women in preparation for work in Cuba; Miss Dorothy Crossley, of Philadelphia, now Director of Religious Education in St. Mark's Parish, Frankford; Miss Ella Davis, of Connecticut, now a worker at St. Martha's House; Miss Mabel Hissey, of New York, now a worker at St. Mark's Mission, Nenana, Alaska; Miss Rachel Jackson, of New Hampshire, now at St. Elizabeth's School in South Dakota; and Miss M. W. Sumner, now in charge of a Mission Settlement House at Flat Rock, N. C. (her home Diocese) and also the Assistant Diocesan Secretary of the Young People's Service League. It is very gratifying to feel that these young women are now giving themselves to such a variety of church work in such a wide area, and that they are busy and happy in the Master's service.

Deaconess Chapter. The Philadelphia Chapter of Deaconesses has held three meetings here during the year. One of these was a Quiet Half Day, when the Rev. S. V. Wilcox conducted the devotions. In May, the National Executive Committee of Deaconesses, of which Deaconess Colesberry and I are members, met here. It was a great joy to entertain these

visiting Deaconesses. The time spent together was given to much interesting discussion and real fellowship. It is a matter of real concern to us all that so few young women seem to be thinking of entering the Order. This is especially true of the graduates of this school. We would like to know the reason for this. Is it that the life seems too hard or lonely or uncertain? Is it that Bishops and clergy in general prefer their trained workers not to be set apart? Is it due to a dislike of the uniform? I shall be glad to receive opinions from any one interested in this.

Gifts to the School. We are under obligation to many friends for many kindnesses. We have mentioned several substantial gifts under Repairs and Equipment. Others are: Flowers for the Altar, sent regularly by the Managers and Associates; A fine desk for my use; Chapel supplies of many kinds, two sets of linen dust covers, two fair linens, lace for two super-frontals, a lectern lamp, a pair of cruets, two sets of burse and veil, one white and one purple, 40 new Prayer Books, and money for other further equipment; \$50 for table linen (from Mrs. Fries); tickets for many concerts and lectures; entertainment in many homes; Two weeks vacation for four students in Atlantic City; Christmas gifts both to the school as a whole and to individuals; gifts to the Seniors at Commencement; the Alumnæ Luncheon (from Mrs. Houston); financial help for some of the students. The list of names would be long but our thanks are now meant for you all, for having shown your interest in the school in so many thoughtful and kind ways.

Personal Activities. The routine of desk work (correspondence, records, reports, accounts, etc.) fills an important part of my time. I have kept up several lines of study also. In April I received the N.A.T.A. Certificate along with the other

Normal School Graduates. I am glad thus to be in close touch with the actual work they are doing. During the year I have written 649 letters for the school (personal correspondence is entirely separate) and I have addressed envelopes for 600 Reports, 150 Tea Invitations, and 180 Commencement Invitations, making a total of 1,579 pieces of mail I have sent out. I have written sections for each Newsletter and an article for the Diocesan Church News. During the year I have had several trips away, sometimes to speak on China but always to refer to our school. In November I was in Rhode Island and Connecticut for four days; in December, in Vermont for the Christmas holidays; in May I went to Boston to speak at the U.T.O. Presentation Service and Conference; in June I had a month's vacation in Vermont; in July I attended the Blue Mountain Conference in Frederick, Md.; in September I attended the meeting of the National Executive Committee of Deaconesses and the Retreat in New York; in October I attended the Provincial Synod in Harrisburg, and then spent a day in Williamsport; and last week I was in Pittsburgh for the Diocesan U.T.O. Service and Conference, as a speaker. I have spoken at all sorts of meetings in and near Philadelphia, at Church services, or Church Schools, W. A. meetings, G.F.S. suppers; Toc H meeting; at the Interdenominational Prayer-Day Meeting; at the Y.W.C.A. Committee of Religious Education; at a number of Y.P.F. meetings, etc. It is always interesting to meet and know so many people interested in the church's work and to feel that we are all workers together with God.

The Assistant House Mother. Deaconess Humphreys has carried her share of work most efficiently, and has also helped much in other ways, besides looking after our physical comforts. She has helped in the chapel services and music as well

as the work in the classes she has taught. She has improved in health in spite of her many duties and my gratitude to her is sincere and deep. We both wish to thank our faithful helpers, the three colored maids, Cora, Rose and Emma, and also the extra helpers, the furnace man, laundress, and cleaning woman, all of whom do good work for the school.

On All Saints' Day, at the early Communion Service in our Chapel, we remembered the names of four of our graduates who have entered into the nearer presence of our Lord during this year. These were:

Without the daily sympathetic backing of our firm friends, the Board of Managers; and the friendly personal interest of the Associates; and the splendid work of the faithful Faculty through all the months of steady teaching; and the help of our Bishops, Warden and Chaplain; and all who uphold their hands and ours, by gifts of money, prayers and work, we could do nothing. May God bless you all and bless our School, so that we may joyfully and effectively serve him in this work.

General Information for Prospective Students.

The Church Training and Deaconess School is intended to meet the needs of three classes of women:

1. Those who wish to prepare for the Deaconess Order;
2. Those who wish to devote themselves to Church work at home or abroad, but without entering an Order;
3. Those who wish to take up religious study for their own improvement, or to become more useful in their home parishes.

ADMISSION

Applicants for admission should be at least twenty-one years old and under forty. The course of study is planned for women having at least a high-school education or its equivalent.

Students having credit in approved schools or colleges for subjects required by this School may be given recognition upon presentation of credentials to the Director of Curriculum.

An applicant will be required to answer in writing questions on the form which will be sent on request, and to send these, with the required certificate from her physician, to "The Admission Committee, 708 Spruce Street, Philadelphia, Pa." Students, upon entering the course of training, may be required to see and be examined by a physician approved by the Board.

It is required that applicants be vaccinated, that eyes, nose and throat be examined, and that teeth be put in

order before entering. If necessary to have the tonsils removed, it should also be done before coming to the School.

Applicants must be accepted by the Admission Committee and enter as student visitors for at least two months' probation before they can be recognized as students.

Only the names of regular students appear in our printed reports.

COURSES OF STUDY

1. *Regular Students*.—The full course of training covers two years.

2. *Special Students*.—Those who do not take the full course and are not eligible for graduation.

Students desiring to pursue postgraduate courses or to complete a college course will find many opportunities in connection with colleges, universities and special schools in Philadelphia. Such courses are at their own expense. The life in the school gives a religious and social environment to such students.

3. *Missionary Students*.—Women sent by the Department of Missions to be tested; their training is adapted to their special needs.

At the end of each term examinations are held, or term papers are required and no student is allowed to proceed if conditioned in three subjects.

DIPLOMAS AND CERTIFICATES

By-Law, Article VIII

SEC. 5. Upon the satisfactory completion of the prescribed course of study and training, the student shall receive a diploma signed by the Bishop, Warden, President of the Board of Managers, and the Head Deaconess.

SEC. 7. The diploma of the School may be refused to any student not proving satisfactory at any time before the end of her training.

To non-residents completing the required studies in one or more departments a certificate of the work accomplished will be given upon application.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR EMPLOYMENT

We receive applications for graduates as Parish and City Mission Visitors, Leaders in Religious Education, Social Service workers, heads of day nurseries, orphanages, homes of various kinds, hospitals, settlement workers, teachers and principals of Church schools, diocesan deaconesses and missionaries for the home and foreign fields. Thus far we have always had more applications than we could fill.

EXPENSES

Residents.—The charge for resident students, including tuition, training and the use of necessary books, is \$300 for the school year, payable in advance, in October and February. This charge includes a reasonable amount of laundry, but does not include medical care, or fees for any work taken outside of the school, such as University classes, Gymnasium, etc.

Paying visitors are charged at the rate of \$2 per day if for short visits. If permanent for a term or more, rooms are at the rate of \$15 per month, and meals at \$1.20 per day. If one meal is regularly taken outside a reduction will be made.

Resident Students taking the full course are at no expense for the required practical training in summer, except for hospital uniforms.

All necessary furniture and house linen are supplied by the school. It is suggested that an extra pair of blankets or top comfortable be provided by each student when possible.

Non-Residents.—Women living in Philadelphia or its vicinity and attending the classes will be charged one dollar for each subject for each half year. (This is the same rate as the Diocesan Normal School Classes.)

THE UNIFORM

A uniform of midnight blue (with a plain coat and hat, and black shoes), is worn after the probation period. Students are required to wear the uniform for Chapel services, classroom work and practical work connected with the school. At other times the students may wear their ordinary clothes.

SCHOLARSHIPS

A few scholarships are provided each year by friends of the school.

The Managers hope that, while no desirable applicant should be debarred from training through lack of means, she will, if possible, provide for the first year at least.

The course of training is so exacting that it has been necessary to prohibit students from attempting to work for their support while in the school.

THE SCHOOL YEAR

The Academic Year is divided into two terms of sixteen weeks each, and begins with the first Wednesday in October, ending with Commencement Day, the last Wednesday in May.

Summer Work.—In addition to the eight months of study, a Regular Student must give ten weeks each summer, or

twenty weeks in all, to hospital service or other practical work assigned as an equivalent.

Vacations consist of ten days or two weeks at Christmas, one week at Easter, and six weeks in summer. It is planned that each student shall have one day each week at her own disposal.

The Roster provides for a total of thirty-two class-room hours' work, each assuming two hours of preparation.

Opportunity is also provided in the Roster for Elective Studies.

To receive the Diploma of the School, satisfactory work must be done in the thirty-two class-room subjects, and in four elective subjects.

Departments of Study.

Bible I. DEACONESS E. S. HUMPHREYS. For the first year.

One hour in class room work, two hours assigned reading each week. The course is based on "The Background of the Bible" by Henry Kendall Booth. Short history of modern literary criticism. Introduction to Old Testament Criticism (using Driver's Introduction in study of Genesis). Effect of archeological discoveries in Biblical history. Visit to University of Pennsylvania Museum. Geography of Holy Land. Making of maps, outline, pictorial and relief. Short outline of Old Testament History. Study of compilation of Old Testament. History of English Bible. Using Moffatt's translation and working back to early translations.

Old Testament I. Old Testament History. REV. STANLEY V. WILCOX.

The geography of Palestine and pre-Israelitish history; History of the Hebrews to the first century B. C.

Required of Juniors. One hour a week for one year.

Old Testament II. Old Testament Religion. REV. STANLEY V. WILCOX.

Required of Seniors. One hour a week for one year.

New Testament I. *Life of Jesus.* REV. ROBERT OLIVER KEVIN. One hour a week for the first year.

The course will include a brief study of Palestinian geography and its relation to the ministry of Jesus; a consideration of Jewish life and thought in the first century; a preliminary study of Gospel origins; and a full inquiry into the life and work of Christ. Conflicting points of view will be examined and appraised for their full worth. Lectures and readings.

New Testament II. *The Four Gospels.* REV. ROBERT OLIVER KEVIN. One hour a week for the second year.

Each of the gospels will be read in full and their contents analyzed. A study will be made of their origins and growth, authorship and dating. The agreements and divergences among the first three gospels, and between them and the Gospel of St. John will be observed. Lectures, class work, and assigned readings.

New Testament III. *The Acts of the Apostles.* REV. BENJAMIN N. BIRD.

Required of Juniors. One hour a week for one year.

A study of the contents of the Book of Acts, with special reference to the background and development of the religious life, organization, and scope of the Church in the Apostolic age. Lectures, special reading, and written assignments.

New Testament IV. *St. Paul's Epistles.* REV. BENJAMIN N. BIRD.

Required of Seniors. One hour a week for one year.

A connected story of St. Paul's life, showing his background and personal characteristics. A careful study of the occasion, aim, subject and leading topics of each letter, showing the development of St. Paul's thought and his religious teachings in each. This will be followed by a careful résumé of his contribution to Christianity, in recovering the mind of Christ for the world of his day.

Lectures, Reading on special topics and written assignments.

New Testament V. RT. REV. F. M. TAITT, D.D.

Catholic Epistles and Revelation.

Required of Seniors. One hour a week for one year.

1. *The Catholic Epistles*—which they are and why so called, and the distinctive character of each. The subject is treated in a practical way, and an effort is made to show how the messages of these Epistles may be helpful in the personal and devotional life of the members of the class and how they may be useful in their dealing with others.
2. *The Revelation of St. John.* Short discussion of the writer and date of the book. A general outline of the book and some principles of interpretation. The symbolic picture of the Son of Man as possessing all that is necessary for the needs of the Church; and the seven Churches symbolic of the whole Church. How these messages may be applied to the Church to-day.
3. *The Epistle to the Hebrews.*

Christian Doctrine I. REV. FREDERICK E. SEYMOUR.

Required one hour a week for one year.

THE CHURCH CATHECHISM: Introduction. *Christian Covenant*: Individuality, Privileges, Responsibilities, Problem of Evil, Obligations, Grace. *Christian Faith*: Source of Authority in Religion; Origin, Development and History of Creeds; Summary of Interpretation. *Christian Commandments*: Analysis and Interpretation of the Decalogue; Christian Ethics: Conscience; Christian Duty. *Christian Prayer*: Nature and Necessity of Prayer; Analysis and Interpretation of the Lord's Prayer; Efficacy of Prayer. *Christian Sacraments*: Grace and the Sacraments; Sacramental Principle; Efficacy of Sacraments; (a) Christian Baptism, Significance. (b) Holy Communion, Eucharist in the New

Testament; Theories; Doctrine of the Real Presence: Significance. (c) "Lesser Sacraments."

Required one hour a week for one year.

Doctrine of God. Evidences; Primitive conception; Growth of Hebrew conception; Christian development of the Idea of God; Trinity in Unity; Fatherhood. *Doctrine of Man.* Creation; Religion; Sin. *Doctrine of the Son.* Incarnation; Atonement; Resurrection and Ascension. *Doctrine of the Holy Spirit.* Person and Work of the Holy Spirit. *Doctrine of the Church.* The Church in the New Testament; The Church as the Body of Christ; Notes of the Church in the Creeds; The Christian Ministry. *Eschatology:* Primitive conceptions; Development; Intermediate State; Immortality.

Christian Missions I.

(a) Current Year Mission Study Text Book. 10 class periods and assigned reading. MRS. J. E. HILL.

(b) History, Principles, Methods and Problems of Christian Missions. DEACONESS STEWART. 10 class periods and assigned reading.

From Apostolic times to modern times, including short biographical studies of famous missionaries of each period, and the methods employed.

(c) Missionary Lectures, given by returned missionaries as opportunity offers through the year. At least 10 periods.

Christian Missions II.

(a) The General Program of the Church. 10 class periods and assigned reading. MRS. J. E. HILL.

(b) Current Year Mission Study Text Book. 10 class periods and assigned reading. MRS. J. E. HILL.

(c) Modern Missions throughout the World. 10 periods and assigned reading, supplemented by missionary addresses at times. DEACONESS STEWART AND OTHERS.

Church History I. VEN. JAMES F. BULLITT.

I. Ancient Church History, from the Apostolic Age to the Reformation. Required one hour a week for one year.

Church History II. VEN. JAMES F. BULLITT.

English and American Church History. Required one hour a week for one year.

Church Worship I. REV. H. R. GUMMEY, D.D.

Required one hour a week for one year.

(a) Brief Sketch of the History of Christian worship to the making of the English Prayer Book, 1549.

- (b) Study of the History and Contents of the Prayer Book through to the Communion office.

Church Worship II. REV. H. R. GUMMEY, D.D.

Required one hour a week for one year.

- (a) Study of Prayer Book completed.
- (b) The government of the Church and origin and development of the Christian ministry.
- (c) Constitution of American Church and Important Canons.

Hygiene and Sanitation. SENECA EGBERT, M.D.

One hour a week for the first half-year.

1. The causation and prevention of disease; study of bacteria and other disease germs; theories of immunity; use of antitoxins, etc.
2. The influence of impure air upon health; methods and principles of ventilation; consideration of ventilating and heating apparatus.
3. Sources of water-supplies; methods of purification; study of filters; discussion of disturbances and diseases due to impure water, and the benefits to be derived from abundant supplies and use of pure water.
4. Foods; dietetic principles; relation of foods to stimulants; use and abuse of stimulants.
5. Personal hygiene, with special reference to the influence of heredity, constitution, exercise, bathing, clothing, light, etc.
6. The disposal of house-wastes and sewage; principles of sewage plumbing; methods of sewage treatment, etc.
7. Disinfection; study of disinfectants and antiseptics; quarantine and care of infectious diseases.

Seniors: During the second year Dr. Egbert conducts an optional course of one hour a week for one term, which includes talks and conferences upon obstetrics and maternity, care of mother and child, home nursing, advice to girls, rescue work, etc.

Parish Administration.

- (a) Women in the Parish. MISS EDNA BEARDSLEY. 10 class periods.
- (b) Methods of Parish Work. A symposium of 10 periods given by various experienced parish workers, DEACONESS BROOKMAN, MISS HENK and others.
- (c) Business Methods. 10 periods. Simple accounts, banking, etc. Supplemented by addresses by DR. LEWIS B. FRANKLIN, parish Treasurers, and others.

Psychology I. REV. J. L. HADY.

One hour a week for one year.

Principles and methods of Psychology, Socio-biological view of human nature. Phases of individual development. Character building and the religious spirit: primary experience and interpretative guidance.

Psychology II. REV. J. L. HADY.

One hour a week for one year.

Human nature, social conduct, and religious objectives. Religious education, methods and processes: a genetic treatment. Religious experience and religious institutions: programs and methods.

Public Speaking I. MISS MARTHA C. BARRY.

Public Speaking II. REV. A. A. EWING.

It is the object of this course to give the students actual practice in making addresses of different kinds, including meditations, instructions, narratives, reports, dinner speeches, appeals for converts, and appeals for money.

Emphasis is laid on the mental processes involved to the end that there may be definiteness of objective, certainty of method, simplicity and confidence in presentation.

Lectures are given as required and the work is accompanied by individual criticism.
