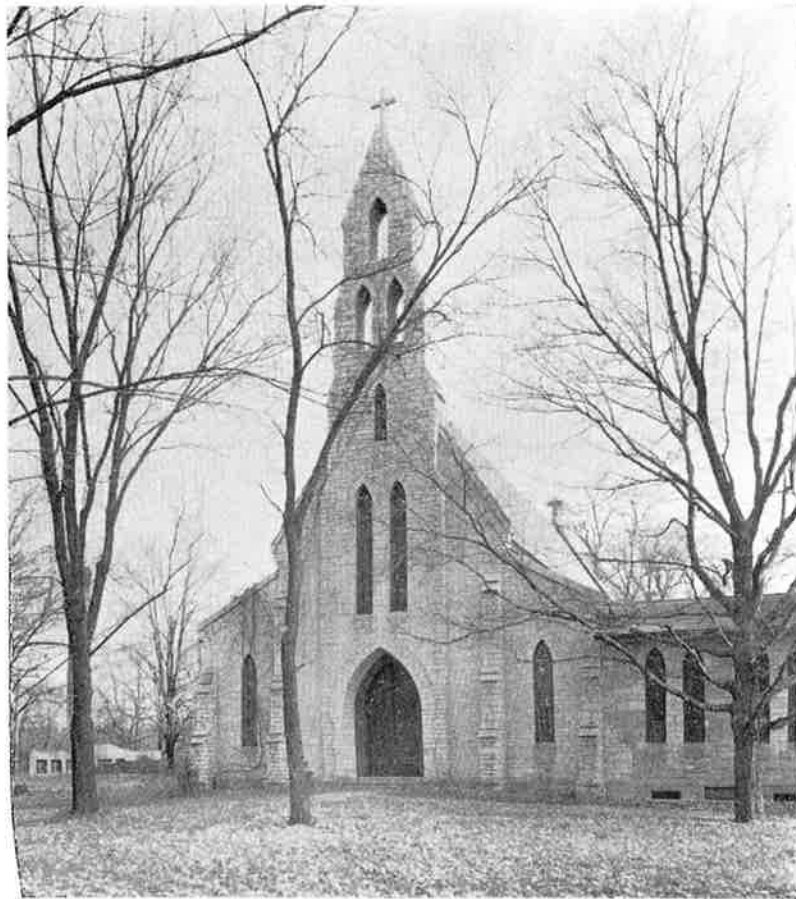

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HISTORICAL INFORMATION

LOCATION AND GENERAL INFORMATION

NASHOTAH HOUSE is located in the country, on the shore of Upper Nashotah Lake. Its domain comprises about one square mile, on the east shores of the Nashotah Lakes. It is about thirty miles west of Milwaukee, a mile west and south of Nashotah Village, and a mile west and north of Delafield.

Nashotah, Wisconsin, is on the main line of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railroad, between Milwaukee, Madison, and St. Paul. Since it is a small village only two trains stop there daily and none on Sundays. However all mail, baggage and express, should be addressed to Nashotah House, Nashotah, Wisconsin.

For better train service, new students should buy their tickets through to Oconomowoc, Wisconsin, which is six miles west of the House, but should check their baggage to Nashotah. Taxi service can be had at Oconomowoc, and if the House is notified as to the time of arrival of new students, they can be met.

The Greyhound Bus lines have a bus service between Milwaukee and Madison, one route going through Nashotah, and the other through Delafield. Students coming by bus can be met at either place, if they will give previous notice as to the time of their arrival.

For those coming by private car, the accompanying map has all of the highways marked to facilitate locating the House. Since the earliest days Nashotah House has been known locally as "The Mission," and if one needs to ask for information both names may need to be used. The House is on a country road and not on a main highway or on a county road.

Telegraph service comes through Oconomowoc, Wisconsin.

Telephone service comes through the Delafield, Wisconsin Exchange, telephone Delafield 411.

NASHOTAH HOUSE, located on the shore of Upper Nashotah Lake in the center of the beautiful and famous Southern Wisconsin lake resort region, is two miles from Nashotah village, which is on the main line of the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific Railway, twenty-seven miles west of Milwaukee.

The founding of Nashotah House is one of the results of the great missionary impulse in the American Church which was marked by the consecration of Jackson Kemper as Bishop of the Northwest in 1835. It was on his first return to New York, after having explored his vast jurisdiction extending from Lake Superior to the Gulf of Mexico, that his story, told to some young students soon to be ordained, led them to undertake an Associate Mission in the then Far West. They began the work at Nashotah in 1842, hoping to establish there a Religious Community, the first in the Anglican Church since the Reformation. "Wisconsin was then a wilderness, Milwaukee but a village, and Chicago counted not more than five thousand inhabitants, if so many. There were but four clergy in all Wisconsin besides Bishop Kemper in 1841."

Though three young deacons set out together, it is to James Lloyd Breck and to William Adams that the credit belongs of actually establishing the work. From the first, the idea of a training school for the priesthood was an essential part of the Associate Mission, and while Nashotah House to this day is called for miles around "The Mission," it has been known throughout the Church for more than a century as a seminary of theological training, though the original idea of a Religious Order for men had to be abandoned. During Dr. Breck's presidency it was incorporated under the laws of Wisconsin as "Nashotah House."

The House was founded, not only to be a missionary outpost in the wilderness, but to be a stronghold of Tractarian orthodoxy. This characteristic has been firmly maintained for over a hundred years. Nashotah is well known throughout the Church for her sound churchmanship, and for her loyalty to what we consider the historic principles of the Anglican Reformation.

The square mile of land purchased from the Government by Dr. Breck has been held intact to this day. The Indian trail is still to be traced, and close by it an excavation in the ground marks the site of the claim agent's cabin, where the first services were held.

Much of the land remains in its natural wooded condition, a large portion of this timber skirting the twin Nashotah Lakes. In the cemetery, overlooking these lakes, are the tombs of Bishop Kemper, James Lloyd Breck, William Adams, and many other bishops and priests who have been associated with The House. Landmarks of the early days remain. Within a few yards of the new library stands the old "Blue House," a small frame building, the original home of the Community. Close by is the "Red Chapel," also of wood, which was built in 1843, and was used for daily services for almost twenty years. These two buildings are carefully and reverently preserved.

The newer buildings are of Wisconsin sandstone and of attractive form. The present chapel, dedicated to St. Mary the Virgin, was begun in 1859 and completed after the Civil War. It is beautifully furnished and equipped. Shelton Hall contains the refectory and kitchen, and overflow accommodation for students. Alice Sabine Hall, familiarly called "The Cloister," is arranged in suites for the students. Lewis Hall contains the Dean's office and rooms for some of the faculty. Bishop Webb Hall, a fine modern dormitory, provides a home for the younger collegiate men. Frances Donaldson Hall contains an excellent library of some 16,000 volumes, which is kept well up to date. There are in addition to these buildings four homes for faculty members on the campus.

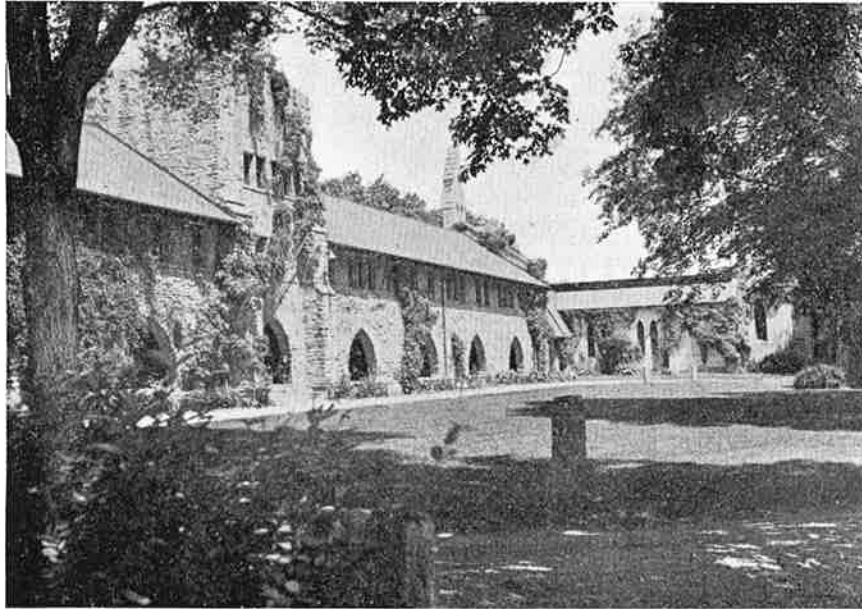

SEMINARY INFORMATION

The Seminary Year

The Seminary year will begin on September 20, 1948, and continue for a period of thirty-two weeks exclusive of vacations. There is a vacation at Christmas and one at Easter, with short suspension of recitations on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and all days of Thanksgiving or Fasting appointed by the Ecclesiastical or Civil authority.

Time of Entrance

Students may enter either semester, but it is strongly advised, because of the revision in the program of studies, that they enter the first semester. This program is outlined in the Master Plan, which will be found on page 28. The incoming Junior Class of 1948-1949 will enter under this plan. It will be noted that there is a sequence of study in each department of the Seminary and students entering the second semester will find themselves at a distinct disadvantage in not having had the first semester's work.

Requirements for Admission

Men holding a degree from a recognized college, who are Postulants for Holy Orders, matriculate as regular students without examination. They must make application for admission on the Form provided by Nashotah House. They must have complied in full with the Canons, presenting a certified copy of their physical and neuropsychological examination, an official transcript of their college record, and if they have attended another institution for either graduate work, or seminary training, a transcript of that record with a certificate of Honorable Dismissal from the institution where they have been doing their study, and also an unmounted photograph (3x3) of themselves.

Each application for admission must be accompanied by a letter from the applicant's Bishop, stating that he has given the applicant permission to enter Nashotah House if accepted, and to pursue his studies there till graduation.

All applications for admission are acted upon by the Faculty, and it is important that all data be in the hands of the Faculty at the earliest possible date. All applications for the first semester should be received for action by September 1st, and for the second semester by January 1st each year. The applicant will be officially notified

as to the status of his application after Faculty action has been taken.

Men who are not graduates of a college, may be permitted to matriculate, if after presentation of their scholastic record and other credentials, they are judged capable of profitably pursuing the work of the seminary. Such individuals will have the status of a special student but cannot become candidates for the certificate of graduation or for a degree. They are subject to all the requirements listed above and to follow, the only difference being in their academic status.

Rooms and Furniture

The students live in apartments, consisting of one large study with bedrooms adjoining, accommodating two men. All rooms are steam-heated and electrically lighted.

The House provides each man with a bed and mattress, one study table, one study chair, one bed-room chair, one small bureau, and a book shelf. All other furniture is supplied by the student himself. He will need blankets and sheets (twin-bed size), pillow and pillow cases, towels, an electric table lamp, rugs, drapes, floor lamps, easy chairs, and other non-essential articles, which may be brought from home or can be purchased locally.

The Seminary has one apartment house for a limited number of married students. Details as to the furnishing will be supplied by the Business Manager.

Each man is required to provide his own cassock, which should be strong enough to stand continuous wear.

Students pay for their books, and take care of their travelling and personal expenses.

Work Program

Nashotah House is a self-help institution. All students are required to take their share of the community work. A schedule is made out each year for an equitable distribution of community work such as waiting tables, washing dishes, cleaning of the buildings which are used in common.

Scholarships

In certain cases where a student has a good record and is dependent upon outside help, a scholarship to cover a part of his fees is allowed by the House.

Generous friends of Nashotah have from time to time provided funds for such scholarships, but the demands made upon the House are far in excess of the revenue derived from specified gifts and bequests.

It is to be hoped that more churchmen with means will devote their gifts to a purpose which, while it encourages candidates for the Ministry, also furthers in a most direct way the growth and extension of the Church.

Chapel Services

The Holy Eucharist is celebrated, and Morning and Evening Prayer are said daily. Seminarists are required to attend these services regularly. The Compline Office is also said daily. Meditations are given in chapel, and other helps to a spiritual life are provided.

The Choral services at Nashotah House consist of the Holy Eucharist on Sundays and Holy Days and of Evensong daily. Plain-song is used for all choral services.

LANGUAGE REQUIREMENTS

It is recommended that a student include the study of Latin and Greek in his undergraduate course. All New Testament study at The House is based on the Greek text and presupposes a reading knowledge of New Testament Greek. Those who enter seminary without this knowledge supply the deficiency by taking without credit 6 hours in elementary Greek given 3 hours each semester in the junior year; and, if necessary, 2 additional hours in the middle year. A refresher course in Greek reading is given 1 hour each semester in the junior year for those entering prepared in Greek.

In the study of Hebrew at The House, no credit is given for less than 4 semester hours. The Certificate of Graduation will read "*lingua Hebraica inclusa*" for no less than 8 semester hours of Hebrew or other Semitic language. Otherwise the certificate will read "*lingua Hebraica exclusa*."

While Latin is not required either for admission or for receipt of The Certificate of Graduation, a reading knowledge of Ecclesiastical Latin is necessary to qualify for any degree. A tutorial course in Latin is offered without credit.

THE COURSE OF STUDY

The regular course of study consists of all the required courses and at least 8 semester hours of elective courses, which amounts to a total of at least 100 semester hours (excluding courses numbered below 10, for which no credit is given). The work is divided into 3 academic years of 2 semesters each.

ENGLISH BIBLE EXAMINATION

In addition every student shall pass a comprehensive examination on the contents of The English Bible, which he shall take during the first September after his admission. If necessary, he shall take a make-up examination the following September in either The Old Testament (including The Apocrypha), The New Testament or the whole Bible.

REGISTRATION

Every student shall register on the form provided for all courses, which he is taking for credit, within the first 2 weeks of each semester and no change shall be made in this program of studies after the first 4 weeks of the semester. Every undergraduate student in residence, regular or special, shall take at least 15 semester hours of work each semester.

GRADES

Grades are awarded as follows: A, excellent; B, good; C, average; D, pass but unsatisfactory; E, failure, with maximum grade of C allowed on repetition of the course.

If incomplete work in a course of a fall semester is not completed within the first 8 weeks of the following spring semester or if incomplete work in a course of a spring semester is not completed within the first 2 weeks of the following fall semester, the grade E is awarded for the course. The responsibility of making arrangements for the completion of work, whether by make-up examination or otherwise, rests upon the student with an incomplete record.

SCHOLARSHIP REGULATIONS

Hour credits are the quantitative measure of work, *honor credits* the qualitative. For each hour passed with better than a grade of D, a student receives honor credits: for A, 3 credits; for B, 2 credits; and for C, 1 credit. *The honor quotient* is the ratio between the honor credits and the hour credits, that is the quotient obtained by dividing the total number of honor credits earned by the total number of semester hours completed. For example, a program of 15 semester hours, on which 30 honor credits were earned, would yield an honor quotient of 2 or an average grade of B.

In order to remain a student of The House, either regular or special, an average of no less than C is to be maintained on each year's work. However in an unusual case, as when a student is subject to Canon 26, Section 5, Sub-Section (c), of The General Convention, the faculty may grant him a dispensation to remain as a special student.

SPECIAL STUDENTS

A student is classified as special and does not qualify to graduate, (a) if he is not a college graduate, (b) if he is not pursuing the regular course of study, (c) if he fails on a make-up English Bible examination or (d) if he is granted a dispensation from the C average scholarship regulation.

GRADUATION

The Dean and Faculty will recommend that The Board of Trustees award The Certificate of Graduation to those students in good standing who complete the regular course of study with an average grade of no less than C and who have no outstanding indebtedness to The House.

DEGREES

A recipient of a degree shall be in Holy Orders, shall have a degree of Bachelor of Arts or its equivalent from some recognized institution and shall possess a working knowledge of New Testament Greek and of Ecclesiastical Latin. No degree is conferred *in absentia* except by special dispensation of The Faculty.

THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF DIVINITY

For Graduates of The House

1. The degree *summa cum laude* is awarded to a student who has graduated from The House with an honor quotient of no less than 2.9.

2. The degree *magna cum laude* is awarded to a student who has graduated from The House with an honor quotient of no less than 2.6.

3. The degree *cum laude* is awarded to a student who has graduated from The House with an honor quotient of no less than 2.3.

4. The degree is awarded to a student, who has graduated from The House with an honor quotient of no less than 2, on the fulfilment of the following conditions:

(a) That the faculty approve an application from him to write a dissertation on a stated subject under the guidance of a member of the faculty.

(b) That he submit to the faculty an acceptable dissertation not later than April the 15th of the year, in which he expects the degree to be conferred.

5. The degree is awarded to a student, who has graduated from The House (with an honor quotient of no less than 1), on the fulfilment of the following conditions:

(a) That the faculty approve applications from him to pursue a stated course of study including 1 major and 2 minor subjects, all of which may not be in the same department, and to write a dissertation on a stated subject under the guidance of a member of the faculty.

(b) That he pay an application fee of \$15.00.

(c) That he devote at least 6 hours a week to his course of study for at least 12 months.

(d) That he report to his faculty advisor every October, February and May, his candidacy terminating if he fails to report for 1 full year or if he does not qualify for the degree within 6 years.

(e) That he submit to the faculty an acceptable dissertation not later than April the 15th of the year in which he expects the degree to be conferred.

For Those Who Are Not Graduates of The House

6. The degree is awarded to a student, who has graduated from some other recognized seminary, on the fulfilment of the following conditions:

(a) That the faculty approve applications from him to pursue a stated course of study including 1 major and 2 minor subjects, all of which may not be in the same department, and to write a dissertation on a stated subject under the guidance of a member of the faculty.

(b) That he pursue his course of study in residence 1 academic semester, devoting at least 6 semester hours of work to his major and at least the same amount to his 2 minors.

(c) That he pass written examinations in his major and minor subjects with an average grade of no less than B.

(d) That he submit to the faculty an acceptable dissertation not later than April the 15th of the year in which he expects the degree to be conferred.

THE DEGREE OF MASTER OF SACRED THEOLOGY

The degree is awarded to a student, who has the degree of Bachelor of Divinity or its equivalent from some recognized seminary and who has a working knowledge of 1 modern language in addition to English, which is pertinent to his major subject, on the fulfillment of the following conditions:

(a) That the faculty approve applications from him to pursue a stated course of study including 1 major and 2 minor subjects, all of which may not be in the same department, and to write a dissertation on a stated subject under the guidance of a member of the faculty, which shall be substantial in content and shall give evidence of capacity for original research in primary sources.

(b) That he pass written examinations in his major and minor subjects with an average grade of no less than B.

(c) That he submit to the faculty an acceptable dissertation not later than April the 1st of the year in which he expects the degree to be conferred.

(d) That he pass an oral examination before the faculty on the subject-matter of the dissertation.

1. In Residence

1(a) That he pursue his course of study in residence for 2 academic semesters (not necessarily consecutive), devoting at least 12 semesters hours of work to his major and at least the same amount to his 2 minors.

2. Out of Residence

2(a) That he pay an application fee of \$25.00.

2(b) That he devote at least 6 hours a week to his course of study for at least 2 full years.

2(c) That he confer in person with his faculty advisor as requested from time to time for periods totalling as much as 2 months or in lieu thereof pursue his course of study for at least 1 additional year.

2(d) That he report to his faculty advisor every October, February and May, his candidacy terminating if he fails to report for 1 full year or if he does not qualify for the degree within 6 years.

THE COURSES OF STUDY

According to the REVISED PLAN OF STUDY, all courses—Required, Elective, or Seminar—given an *odd number* are offered the first semester only, while those given an *even number* are offered the second semester only.

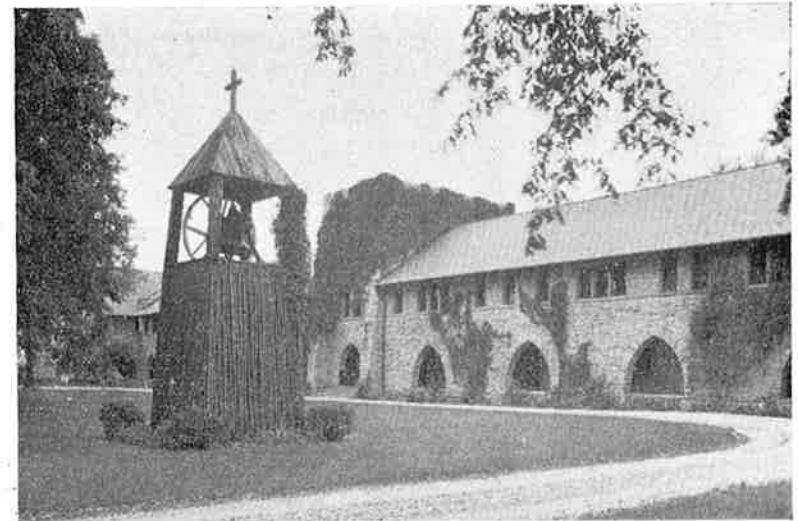

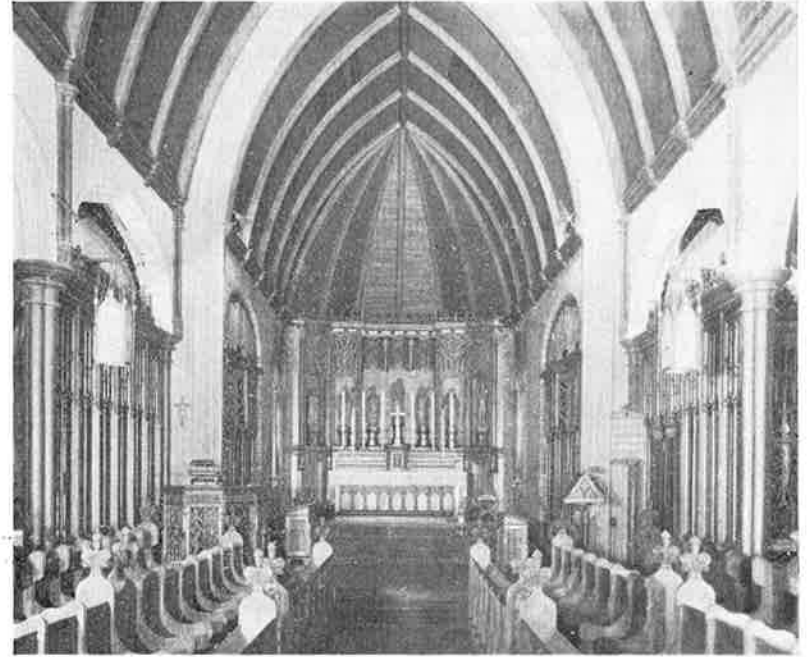

The Bishop Kemper Missionary Society of Nashotah House includes every member of the seminary, the collegiate department, and the faculty of The House. The purpose of its work as defined in its constitution is to foster missionary zeal in the student body, while at the same time aiding in a direct way the work of the Church in the mission field. 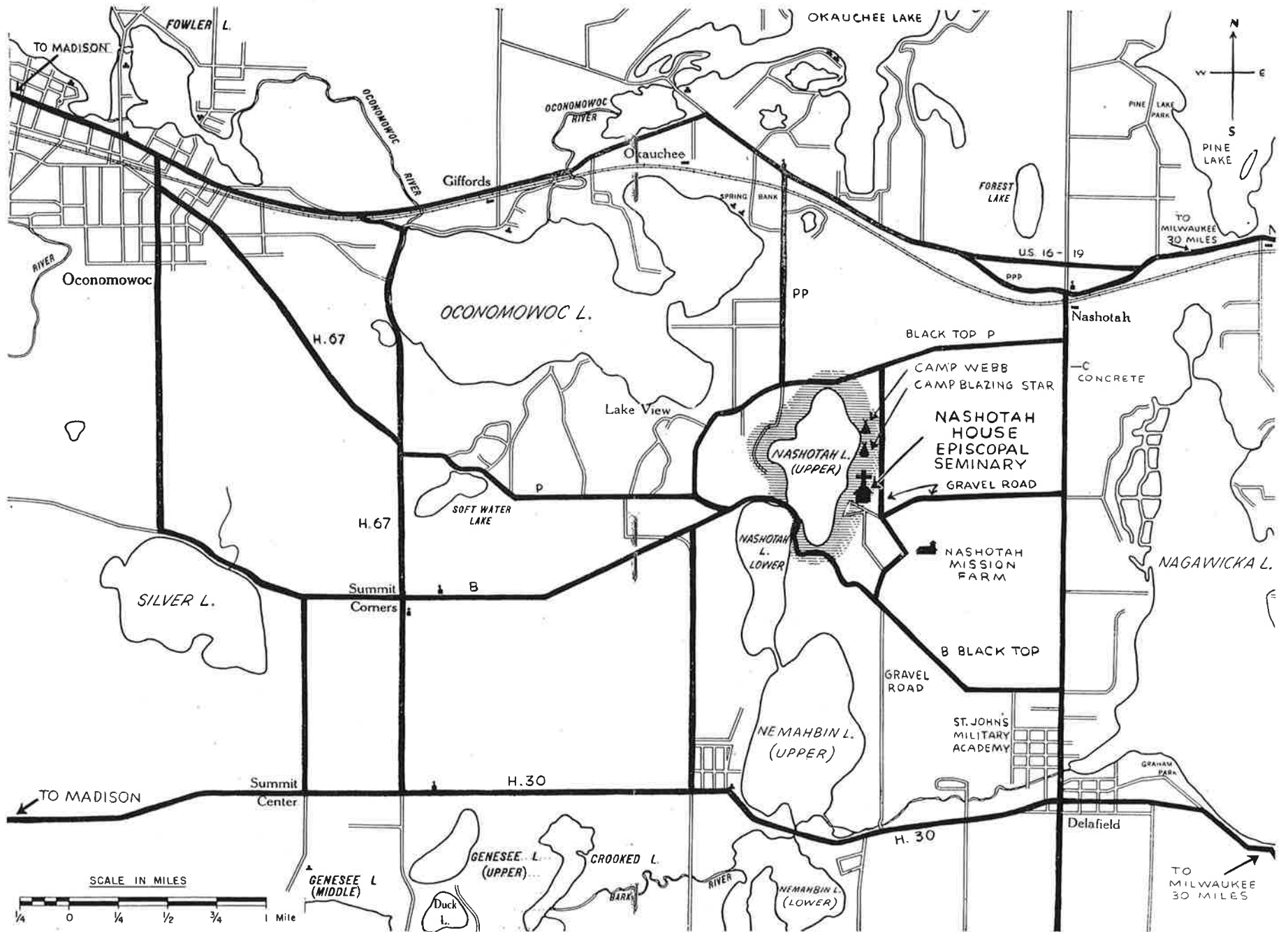
Each year the Society selects a missionary project for special attention. For 1947-48, it has voted to support the mission work for Negroes in the Diocese of Dallas. COLLEGE INFORMATION

The Plan

Nashotah House can accept in residence a strictly limited number of students who are pursuing their pre-theological work in Arts, leading to the degree of B. A. This work will normally occupy the regular period of four years. Nashotah House does not give the college work, but has entered into an agreement with Carroll College, Waukesha, Wisconsin, whereby students, preparing for the ministry of the Episcopal Church, live at Nashotah House and take their college training at Carroll College.

Carroll College

Carroll College is located at Waukesha, Wisconsin, fifteen miles from Nashotah House. Transportation between the two schools is provided free of charge in the House omnibus.

Carroll College is accredited by the Association of American Universities and is a member of the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, with full recognition by the Wisconsin State Department of Public Instruction and by the University of Wisconsin.

I

Requirements for Admission

Students entering under this plan must be Postulants for Holy Orders, or be able to give satisfactory evidence of vocation to the priesthood and must be recommended by their Bishops for pre-theological study at Nashotah House. They must have complied with the Canons of the Church with regard to Postulants, and must have taken the physical and neuro-psychological examinations required in the Canons, and present a copy of the report of those examinations. In addition, they must make application on the Form which is furnished by Nashotah House, giving all necessary data and references. This application and data must be in the hands of the Faculty of Nashotah House for action not later than September 1st, for entrance in the first semester, and not later than January 1st, for entrance in the second semester. The applicant will be notified as to his acceptance or rejection.

Students accepted under this Plan live at Nashotah House, and are subject to the discipline and requirements of The House.

II

Since the academic work is given by Carroll College and the degree of B. A. is granted by Carroll, the student must also make a

formal application to Carroll College and be accepted by the college. Information with regard to the Carroll College requirements for admission may be obtained by writing to:

All information concerning the requirements which Carroll College makes for admission must be obtained directly from the Office of Admissions and not from Nashotah House. Carroll College reserves the right to accept or reject applications according to her standards for admission. Prospective students desiring to enter under this Plan who are rejected by Carroll College are automatically rejected by Nashotah House.

In summary, an applicant for the Plan must be accepted by both Nashotah House and by Carroll College.

All entrants must undertake to complete their theological work at Nashotah House. *It must be clearly understood that no application for collegiate work only will be entertained.*

Special Students

Older men, who are not candidates for a degree, but who wish to augment their academic training, may, with the consent and approval of their diocesan authorities, and with the consent of Carroll College, be enrolled as adult special students, subject to the above listed requirements.

General Requirements for Admission

For admission to the Carroll-Nashotah Plan, an applicant must present evidence of graduation from an accredited high school or preparatory school. It will be assumed that the student has ranked in the upper half of his graduating class and has demonstrated his ability to do college work, by having maintained approximately a "B" average or its equivalent in his preparatory work. He must present references as to character and citizenship and also present a copy of the physical examination which is required by both schools.

Further, he must have shown evidence over a reasonable period of time of an interest in the vocation to the priesthood of the Church through conferences with his Rector and his Bishop.

Advanced Standing

Students transferring from other institutions of similar college grade and who are seeking advanced standing for work completed are subject to the requirements listed above and to additional requirements relative to their transfer.

Courses

Suggested four year courses, numbered 1, 2, 3, will be found on pages 45, 46, 47. *Any changes, variations, or combinations in these which seem desirable, and which will meet the requirements of the B. A. degree of Carroll College, will be allowed or entirely new courses can be arranged; but all must be approved by the Dean of Nashotah House, as these courses must conform to the requirements of the Canon Law.*

Latin and Greek

Students who do not present Latin in their entrance requirements to college must take Latin in College. If Latin of a sufficient amount has been presented, it is advised that the student take two years of either French or German in college, preferably German.

Students must take two years of Greek in college to meet the requirements of Canon Law. Deficiency in Greek or a dispensation from Greek automatically bars a person from ever receiving the degree of B. D.

In addition to the regular courses at Carroll College, students in residence at Nashotah House will be required to take courses of lectures on special topics for one hour each week throughout their college course.

First Year: Introduction to Morals. The Prayer Book and related topics.

Second Year: The Christian Faith as interpreted by the Anglican Communion.

Third Year: The Contents of the English Bible, the Old Testament.

Fourth Year: The Contents of the English Bible, the New Testament and Apocrypha.

If satisfactory courses are taken in college in the Bible, students may be excused from the Bible requirements in whole or in part.

College students pay for their lunches in Waukesha.

Students pay for their books, and take care of their traveling and personal expenses.

Scholarships

Nashotah House grants no scholarships to collegians; but Carroll College is prepared to allow grants-in-aid to students who need such assistance if their work is of high grade.

There is no opportunity for men to earn a remission of fees by part-time work. Nashotah House is a self-help institution and all students are required to undertake certain community duties without pay in return for the low cost of their residence. A definite WORK PROGRAM is set up each year for the community duties. An equitable division of labor is made between every member of the community whether he be in the seminary or the college. The whole community is divided into three sections for a period of ten weeks each. During that time the section on duty is responsible for the cleaning of buildings used in common, for waiting tables at meals and for dish-washing.

Rooms and Furniture

Students ordinarily live two in a room. All rooms are steam-heated and electrically lighted. The House supplies each man with a bed and mattress, two chairs, a bureau, a table, and a book shelf. Most of the beds in the college dormitory are the two-decker type.

All other furniture must be provided by the student. He will need blankets and sheets (twin bed size), a pillow, and pillow slips, towels, and an electric table lamp. Rugs, drapes, floor lamps, easy chairs, pictures, and other non-essential articles, can be brought from home or purchased locally.

Each student is required to provide himself with a cassock, which should be strong enough to withstand heavy wear. This should be purchased before he comes here.

Chapel Attendance

The Holy Eucharist is celebrated every day for the college students. They are required to attend a minimum of two each week, one of which is the Corporate Communion, also Prayer Book Holy Days. They also join with the seminarists at sung evensong in chapel and the sung services on Sundays. Attendance at a minimum of five evensongs each week is required. Attendance at the Choral Eucharist on Sundays is required unless previously excused for sufficient reason.

Nashotah Choir

The seminarists and collegians make up the Nashotah House Choir which sings evensong and the Choral Eucharist on Sundays and Holy Days. Regular attendance at Choir rehearsal is compulsory and attendance is credited as a part of the requirement in the course in Church Music.
