THE FIFTEENTH ANNIVERSARY

Was held in the Church of the Intercession, Washington Heights, Rev. H. Morton Reed, Rector, on Sunday evening, November 13th, 1887. A few facts from the Fifteenth Annual Report having been stated, addresses were made by Dr. Peet and the Rector.

Twelfth Sunday after Trinity offerings are requested from churches and individuals in the Dioceses of New York, Long Island, Albany, Northern New Jersey, Connecticut, Rhode Island, Massachusetts, Vermont, New Hampshire and Maine, the field to which the Society is now limited, and in which its missionaries are holding sign services at upwards of twenty-five different places.

Bible Classes for deaf-mutes meet in St. Ann's Guild Rooms on Sundays, at 4 P. M., immediately after the 2:45 P. M. service for deaf-mutes in St. Ann's Church.

The Guild of Silent Workers meets on the last Tuesday of the month, at 8 P. M. This Society, through its officers and committees, has been instrumental in extending aid to many deaf-mutes and their families in times of trouble. The Secretary is Mr. Solomon P. Cornelius, and the Treasurer, Mr. Isaac N. Soper.

One great object of "The Church Mission to Deaf-Mutes" is to bring deaf-mutes, after they leave school, into pastoral relations. Among the so-called Protestant bodies, the Church with its Book of Common Prayer, with its lessons from Holy Scripture systematically arranged, with the special teachings of the changing seasons of the ecclesiastical year, and with so much that speaks to the eye in its ritual, offers so many advantages that it has drawn within its fold large numbers of our silent brethren. It is hoped that the Rectors will search out the deaf-mutes who are near them and invite them to attend service, seeing that persons are appointed to show them the places in the Prayer Books and Bibles.

MINUTES OF THE TRUSTEES IN RELATION TO THE REV. DR. WESTON.

Dr. Peet, in behalf of the Committee appointed to frame a minute expressive of the feelings of the Trustees with regard to the death of their late associate, Rev. Sullivan H. Weston, D.D., presented the following, which was unanimously adopted:

"The Board of Trustees of the Church Mission to Deaf-Mutes desire to place upon record their deep sense of the loss the Mission has sustained in the death of Rev. Sullivan H. Weston, D.D., who had for several years been associated with them in their labor of love.

"For eleven years an active and most devoted member of the Board of Directors of the New York Institution for the Instruction of the Deaf and Dumb, he had made himself thoroughly familiar with the wonderful transformation which education can effect in their condition, and also with the limitations imposed by their calamity, so that when he also associated himself with us he was able to sympathize, as few can sympathize, with an effort to completion, in a wider sphere, the work of preparation previously performed.

"A man of power, of large experience in benevolent enterprises, tender in feeling and thoroughly appreciative of the usefulness of the work in which we are engaged, he placed his rare gifts at the service of the Mission.

"Wise in counsel, apt in discernment, exact in discrimination, and withal courteous, cheerful, and warm-hearted, his presence enhanced the value of our deliberations and gave an added glow to our meetings, while the influence he brought to bear upon the Christian public, and the interest he excited in behalf of church work among deaf-mutes, added greatly to the favor which has been bestowed upon our cause.

"From the day when, as a teacher, he inspired in the minds of generous youth the desire for mental exaltation and for the attainment of Christian manliness, till, at the summons of his Divine Master, he laid down the service he had so long rendered as one of the most useful as well as honored Ministers of the Gospel in this Diocese and in this country, his whole life was one stream of beneficence, bringing consolation and hope, joy and blessing to the young and the old, to the rich and the poor, and making the world better for his having lived in it.

"Many are now mourning the dissolution of ties which have bound him to them, as to us, with hooks of steel, but none will miss him more than those whose silence became eloquence when it touched his heart, and, through his responsive lips, touched the hearts of many whom he made their friends. We rejoice that his life was so prolonged as to enable him to do so much. We grieve, as all who knew him must grieve, that we may see his face no more on earth."

THE FIFTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE TRUSTEES OF

The Church Mission to Peaf-Mutes.

The representatives of our Society have continued the work entrusted to them for another year, and we have reason to be thankful that much has been accomplished to promote the temporal and spiritual welfare of the deafmutes who have been reached in the Dioceses of New York, Long Island, Albany, Newark and the six Dioceses of New England. Sign services have been held in twenty-five or thirty different places, some weekly, some fortnightly, some monthly and some quarterly. With God's blessing these services are leading an increasing number of deaf-mutes into pastoral relations in connection with the Church whose liturgical worship is of such great advantage to them. This work also interests their hearing relatives and friends. During the year quite a number of deaf-mutes and their relatives have received Baptism, Confirmation, and the Holy Communion.

The experience of each advancing year shows the importance of the sign-language as a means of throwing a flood of light and knowledge into the minds and hearts of our deaf-mute brethren and of leading them to the acceptance of the truths revealed by God to men through our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Signs are to the deaf what sounds are to the hearing. We need this silent language, therefore, in order to *preach* the Gospel to the 35,000 deaf-

mutes of our country. The ministers of Christ to whom this language has become perfectly familiar lose all consciousness of the English language and think directly in signs when addressing congregations of deaf-mutes. While the flow of thoughts and feelings goes on in this language which has a peculiar construction of its own, many proper names have to be spelled out by using the single-handed alphabet. A sign-service is full of deep interest, even to those who do not understand it. While watching the earnest motions of the minister and the wrapt attention of the congregation, purifying and elevating influences from the Holy Spirit will touch the inner life and lead the possessors of all their faculties to be more thankful for their blessings and more sincere in the consecration of themselves to the service of the Master. We trust that the readers of this report will improve their first opportunity of being present at a sign-service. One is held in St. Ann's Free Church for Deaf-mutes and their Friends, West 18th street near Fifth avenue, New York, every Sunday afternoon at 2:45.

In addition to providing as many Sunday and week-night services as possible in the Dioceses mentioned above, our Society has continued to find situations for the unemployed, to minister to the sick and needy, to counsel the perplexed, and to extend sympathy to all the people who are silently fighting the mysterious battle of life.

The details of our own field and the relations which we have with the other departments of Church work among the deaf-mutes of our country call for a large correspondence on the part of our General Manager and his associates. Our representatives occasionally mingle with their brethren in the sign-service of these departments. We all feel that the work is one and is done for the loving Saviour, who said Ephphatha to the deaf and dumb man after he had so touchingly attracted His attention.

Our Mission-House, at 220 East 13th street, has been continued for another year. The missionary in charge has

devoted much time to the pastoral care of deaf-mutes in New York and vicinity. Several of them have boarded there at moderate rates. One of the inmates, having been severely injured, was kindly treated at the New York Hospital. The Gallaudet Home, on the Hudson River, between New Hamburgh and Poughkeepsie, has ministered to eighteen inmates who, for various reasons incident to old age and other infirmities, are unable to earn their own living. One of the women is deaf-mute and blind. We have established this Home for the Deaf-mutes of the State of New York, and trust that before long we can keep all who need its fostering care from the alms-houses. Sign-services have been held every Sunday in the Chapel of the Home, with several celebrations of the Holy Communion. Most of the inmates are communicants.* In the latter part of June a change was made at the Home, and Mr. C. R. Thomson appointed Manager.

When this property was purchased in December, 1885, we left upon it a mortgage of \$15,000. Owing to the exertions of Mr. Thomson, \$2,000 were paid on the 1st of April, 1887. Since then, by the generous donation of \$5,000 from Mr. Robert J. Livingston, this mortgage has been reduced to \$8,000. We trust that other kind-hearted persons will aid us to cancel this indebtedness as speedily as possible.

Many of the details which have characterized the history of our Mission for another year will be found in the following reports from various officers of our Society. We hope they will be carefully read, for we are sure they will lead to a more general support of the increasing work which we have in charge.

We hope to see new names added every year to our list of Life Members and annual subscribers, and to receive from a larger number of churches and individuals, Twelfth Sunday after Trinity offerings so appropriately made on the day when the Gospel recites the miracle of our Lord's curing the deaf and dumb man. May we not also look for legacies?

In the deaths of the Rt. Rev. Horatio Potter, D.D., LL.D., D.C.L., the late venerable Bishop of New York and for fourteen years the President of our Society, and of the Rev. Sullivan H. Weston, D.D., one of our Trustees, we have parted with sympathetic friends and co-workers. May their places be filled by those who will encourage our efforts to cheer the children of silence.

GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

FOR THE

QUARTER ENDING WEDNESDAY EVENING, JAN. 26, 1887.

During the past three months I have conducted most of the sign-services on Sunday afternoons in St. Ann's Church. On the 28th of November, after I had finished the service, my brother, Dr Gallaudet, President of the National College for Deaf-Mutes in Washington, gave some account of his recent visit to England. He had only arrived here on the forenoon of that day. On the 14th, in the evening, I interpreted at the 14th Anniversary of the Church Mission to Deaf-Mutes, held in St. Ann's Church. Bishop Whipple preached. I interpreted in St. Ann's at the Thanksgiving and Christmas Day services. On the 31st of Oct. I conducted a service in St. Paul's, Albany, and Nov. 14th in the Chapel of Trinity Church, Newark. At the latter I administered the Holy Communion to quite a large company of deaf-mutes. On the evening of Dec. 5th I spoke of our work at St. Timothy's, N. Y. On Sunday, Dec. 12th, I preached in three churches of Philadelphia in aid of the work under the pastoral care of Rev. H. W. Syle. On Saturday evening, Oct. 30th, I lectured to the Troy Deaf-Mute Society. On Tuesday evening, Nov. 9th, in the Guild Room of St. Ann's, Dr. Peet, Mr. A. A. Barnes and I organized the Gallaudet Home for Deaf-Mutes Society. Members will pay one dollar a year, and ask their friends and relatives to do the same, for the support of the Home. The Society will extend its operations through the State of New York. Friday, Nov. 12th, I visited the Home. On Wednesday, Nov. 24th, I married Mr. Halsey and Miss Durbrow at Brick Church, N. J. At an Advent service, Wednesday evening, Dec. 1st, in St. Ann's, I interpreted the pastoral letter of the Bishop, as read by Rev. Mr. Krans. Tuesday evening, Dec. 7th, Rev. Mr. Chamberlain's birthday, I attended a Picnic under Gaslight in St. Ann's Guild Room, given by Deaf-Mutes for the benefit of the Home. Friday evening, Dec. 10th, the 99th anniversary of my father's birth, I attended a ball given by the Gallaudet Club in honor of the event, at Lyric Hall. Dec. 20th I visited the New York Institution, and on the 28th I went to Poughkeepsie to see about the taxes on the Home. It was too late to get them off this year. Dec. 30th I had a pleasant visit from Rev. A. W. Mann, consulting with him as to

work at the West. From Jan. 3d to 13th I was unwell at home. On Wednesday, the 12th, I married Mr. Knapp, deaf-mute, and Miss McGovern, from Mt. Moor, Rockland Co. I have visited the Mission House, helped deaf-mutes, written many letters, and asked many for the means we need for our work. I have taken much interest in calling attention to *The Silent Missionary*, a monthly paper under the direction of Revs. Messrs. Syle & Koehler.

QUARTERLY REPORT OF THE GENERAL MANAGER.

NEW YORK, April 27th, 188..

Since the last meeting of the Trustees, I have held services for deafmutes in St. Ann's Church, New York, on seven Sundays, and in Waterbury, Providence, Boston, Cambridgeport, Beverly, Worcester, and Norfolk on the other Sundays. I have also held week-night services in the interest of our mission in Durham, Guilford, Worcester, Stafford, Hartford, Lynn, Fall River, New Bedford, Lowell, and Salem. On four evenings I lectured to deaf-mutes on my trip to California last summer.

On Tuesday forenoon, Feb. 15th, I visited a deaf-mute couple in Lynn. The husband was rapidly failing with consumption. After a conversation, in which he expressed his faith in the Saviour, I offered prayer. I also baptized his little boy. After reaching home, I heard that this deaf-mute man died the day after my visit.

On the afternoons of Ash Wednesday and Good Friday I conducted services for deaf-mutes in St. Ann's Church. At other Lenten services I interpreted for deaf-mutes. At 2:45 p. M. on Easter Day we had a special celebration of the Holy Communion for deaf-mutes. There was a very large congregation. About fifty received.

At 8 P. M., April 11th, I attended a meeting of our Executive Committee on the Gallaudet Home.

At 3 P M., April 12th, in St. Ann's Church, the Rev. Dr. Rainsford married the Rev. Mr. Colt and Miss Bovay. I interpreted for deaf-mutes.

At 3.30 P. M., April 21st, at the residence of Col. William Lamb, Norfolk, Virginia, I married by our sign-language Mr. John Donnell, of Washington, and Miss Mary Content Lamb.

Before going to Norfolk, I had the great pleasure of visiting several times the sale which was progressing in the Guild Rooms of St. Ann's Church, in aid of the Gallaudet Home.

During the quarter I have attended one meeting of the Guild of Silent Workers, found situations for several deaf-mutes, written many letters, and collected some money for our Mission.

On Sunday P. M., April 17th, the Rev. Job Turner, of the Southern dioceses, preached to the deaf-mute congregation at St. Ann's.

Mrs. Wm. A. Freeborn has recently made valuable and acceptable gifts to the Chapel of our Home—a Communion service, books, and linen for the altar, and a surplice and stole. The Communion service was a memorial of her grandson, George Cornell Freeborn, Jr. Rev. Mr. Chamberlain and family have left the Mission House, and Rev. Mr. Colt and wife are now in charge.

REPORT OF THE GENERAL MANAGER TO THE TRUSTEES.

WEDNESDAY EVENING, July 27th, 1887.

For the quarter just passed I have been busy in the work entrusted to me. On seven of the thirteen Sundays I held the sign-services at St. Ann's Church.

On Sunday P. M., May 1st, the Bishop confirmed 53 persons in St. Ann's, of whom four were deaf-mutes.

On Sunday, May 8th, I spoke in the morning at Grace Church, Brooklyn Heights, in relation to our Mission, and at 7.30 P. M. in the Church of the Redeemer. At 3 P. M. I conducted a sign-service at St. Ann's Chapel.

On Sunday morhing, June 12th, I spoke of our Mission at Christ Church, Staten Island.

On June 26th I made an appeal at Zion Church, Wappinger's Falls, at the morning service, and in the afternoon held the Holy Communion in the Chapel of the Gallaudet Home.

On July 3d I assisted in the morning service at Trinity Church, Branford, Conn., and in the afternoon conducted a service at the Gallaudet Family Re-Union, held at the residence of Dr. E. M. Gallaudet, in Indian Neck.

On July 17th I held the Holy Communion service in the Chapel of the Gallaudet Home, and in the evening made an address in relation to our Mission in the Chapel of the State Hospital for the Insane in Poughkeepsie.

On July 24th I made addresses in Christ Church, Greenwich, Conn., and in the Chapel at Byram.

On May 19, Ascension Day, I interpreted for deaf-mutes at the services in St. Ann's.

On June 20th I was greatly encouraged at the receipt of \$5,000 from Mr. Robert J. Livingston towards paying the mortgage on the Home.

During the first week in May I held services in the interests of our Mission in Grace Church, Baltimore, and the Church of the Ascension, Washington.

On Wednesday, May 4th, I was present at the Presentation Day exercises of the National College for Deaf-Mutes in Washington.

During the quarter I baptized a child of deaf-mutes, married three couples of deaf-mutes (one in New Haven, Conn.,) and officiated at the funeral of a deaf-mute communicant of St. Ann's Church, New York. The latter was Mrs. Williamson, one of my pupils when I was teaching at the New York Institution in my early life. I had presented her for confirmation in the Church of the Epiphany, before St. Ann's was founded. I performed the marriage service for her and her deaf-mute husband at St. Ann's Church in October, 1859. God gave them a daughter, and after a while sent His angels to bear the child to Paradise. I said the burial service. Now mother and daughter are together again in the joys of the life beyond the veil. The growth of Mrs. Williamson's spiritual life testified to the fact that the Gospel system in all its richness and fulness can be received by our deaf-mute brethren. My ministrations to this follower of the Saviour, in her declining days, were a great comfort and encouragement to me. During the three months ending this evening, I have attended meetings of the Ex. Committee of the Gallaudet Home, those of the Vestry of St. Ann's Church for Deaf-Mutes, and those of the Directors of the New York Institution for Deaf-Mutes. I have given lessons in signs and the manual alphabet at meetings of St. Ann's Guild. I have been present at meetings of the Guild of Silent Workers. I have lectured on my trip to California to a company of deaf-mutes gathered in St. Ann's Sunday-School Room for the benefit of the Gallaudet Home. I have written a large number of letters to help on our work, and have called from time to time at our Mission House. I have procured employment for quite a number of deaf-mutes.

On the 25th of June Mr. James R. Graham, having ceased to be the farmer of the Gallaudet Home, I ventured to take the responsibility of asking Mr. Clement R. Thomson to take the position of Manager. I was thankful that this arrangement afterwards met the approval of the Executive Committee and the Trustees.

On that day we had a successful lawn-party at the Home.

On the 26th of July I enjoyed the memorable excursion which a large company of deaf-mutes and their friends made to the Home in the steamboat Long Branch. We left New York at 9 A. M. and returned at 10 P. M., having about two hours on the beautiful grounds of the Home.

As time moves on, I see clearly the great results of our Mission to Deaf-Mutes.

REPORT OF THE GENERAL MANAGER TO THE TRUSTEES.

WEDNESDAY EVENING, Oct. 26th, 1887.

I will first call attention to the Sundays of the quarter just passed: On the 31st of July I spoke of our work at St. James's Church, Long Branch, and in the evening held services at the Scarboro House. On the 7th of Aug. I held services for deaf-mutes in Providence, R. I., and Randolph, Mass., and on the 14th in Boston, Cambridgeport and Worcester. At Cambridgeport I baptized a child of deaf mutes.

On the 21st at Trinity Church, Lime Rock, Conn., and on the 28th in Bethesda Church, Saratoga Springs, I spoke of our work. The latter day was the Twelfth Sunday after Trinity.

On Sept. 4th I conducted the services at St. Ann's, New York.

On the 11th I made an address in St. James's Church, Goshen, N. Y., after which a liberal offering was made to support our Mission.

On the 18th I was at St. Ann's, New York, and in the evening made an address at St. Augustine's Chapel.

On the 25th I was at St. Ann's, and in the evening addressed the congregation of St. Thomas's Church, Mamaroneck.

On Oct. 2d I preached the 35th anniversary sermon in St. Ann's at 11 A. M., and repeated it at the afternoon service for deaf-mutes.

On the 9th I was at St. Ann's, holding an evening combined service in St. Mark's, Tarrytown, at which I baptized a child of deaf-mutes.

On the 16th I held services for deaf-mutes in Troy and Albany. In the evening I spoke of our work in Grace Church, Albany.

On the 23d I held two services in the Gallaudet Home, and in the evening made an address in St. Luke's Church, Matteawan.

During the week intervening between the first and second Sundays in August I held service for deaf-mutes in Natick, Nashua, Lowell, Beverly and Lynn. In Beverly I baptized a child of deaf-mutes.

I was prevented from attending the Convention of the Empire Deaf-Mute Association in Syracuse, Aug. 31st, and the one of the Granite State Deaf-Mute Mission, in Henniker, Sept. 3d, by the illness and death of Sister Ellen, at the House of the Good Shepherd, Asbury Park, New Jersey. She entered into rest on the 5th of Sept. Our church work among deaf-mutes always had her sympathy and prayers.

I have attended meetings of the Ex. Committe on the Home, a Trustee meeting, meetings of the Directors of the New York Institution for Deaf-Mutes, and those of the Guild of Silent Workers. I have done considerable general work among deaf-mutes and visited the Mission House more often than usual, owing to the severe illness of Rev. Mr. Colt. On Saturday evening, Oct. 15th, in Troy, and Monday evening, Oct. 17th, in Albany, I lectured to deaf-mutes. On Tuesday, Oct. 18th, in Troy, I married Mr. C. A. Smith and Miss Annie L. Gould. On the 19th and 20th I held services in Schenectady and Newburgh.

TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE CHURCH MISSION TO DEAF-MUTES.

NEW YORK, January 26th, 1887.

Gentlemen—At the date of my last quarterly report I had just been confined almost three weeks at South Framingham, Mass., with typhoid pneumonia.

Monday, October 25th, 1886, I went from there to Boston, and thence the next day to my brother's home in Vermont, where I remained until Friday, November 19th, when I felt my strength sufficiently recovered to begin work again.

Sunday, November 21st, I officiated for deaf-mutes in the Church of the Good Shepherd, Boston, Mass., the Rev. G. J. Prescott, Rector, and in St. Peter's Church, Cambridgeport, Mass., the Rev. E. M. Gushee, Rector.

Sunday, November 28th, I held a sign-service in the Chapel of Trinity Church, Newark, N. J., the Rev. J. S. Reed, Rector.

My work appears to have done good to our brethren. Wherever I have been permitted to hold services I have been met with the greatest kindness on the part of the Rectors and the people. My thanks are due *The Deaf-Mutes' Journal*, for publishing notices for the Deaf. I have tried to do missionary work to the deaf as often as I could, but it has met with difficulties. If I could be supported, I should like to give myself to missionary

work among my brethren.

The Bible Class has been continued under my direction, Mr. A. A. Barnes being Assistant Superintendent. I have been often called away to take sign-services for the deaf. It meets in the Sunday-School room of St. Ann's Church on Sunday, at 4 o'clock P.M. The collections amount to \$11.36; balance on Oct. 1, 1886, \$20.43; expenses to \$29.12; balance in the treasury to Oct. 31, 1887, \$2.67; Prayer Book Fund, \$1.00. Mite chests were distributed among friends in aid of the Gallaudet Home on the Hudson. Collections amounting to \$40.00 were received. The class paid \$5.00 for the re-union and sale for St. Ann's Church; \$5.00 for fair held in the aid of the Gallaudet Home; \$3.12 in full for surplice; \$1.00 for mite chests, and \$10 for Easter offerings.

The Confirmation Class was pretty well attended and received one candidate. The candidate was confirmed by the Bishop in St. Ann's Church on the third Sunday after Easter, 1887, when Dr. Gallaudet presented three other mutes to the Bishop.

G. W. SCHUTT, House Superintendent and Chaplain.

In the latter part of June, 1887, a change was made in the administration of affairs at the Home, and Mr. C. R. Thomson was placed in charge as manager. He has resided there and devoted himself to constant efforts for the success of the Home. He has won the confidence and good will of all who have had dealings with him. He is the local Treasurer, so that donations may be sent directly to him. His post-office address is Wappinger's Falls, N. Y.

For a part of the year Miss Hattie Foland has acted as Matron, and Miss Libbie Foland as Housekeeper. They have striven to make comfortable the aged and disabled deaf-mutes whom our Society has received as inmates. These silent people had reached a point in their lives when they could no longer support themselves. Had not our Home opened its hospitable doors to them life would have become a burden to them, and some would have found their way to the isolation of alms-houses. Most of them, however, can do something to help on the work, the women in house-hold duties, and the men in the farm, the garden, or the orchard.

Religious services have been frequently held on Sundays and other days in the Chapel. Our Chaplain is one of the lay-readers of the Diocese of New York. The Holy Communion has been celebrated monthly.

The Building Fund, referred to in former reports, was used in the purchase of the property (See description on the inside page of the back cover of this Report), the repairs, the furniture and incidentals specially con-

nected with the opening of the Home, involving the cash expenditure of upwards of \$17,000, and leaving a mortgage of \$15,000.

By the exertions of Mr. C. R. Thomson, contributions were received from kind and appreciative friends to the amount of \$2,000, which was paid on account of this indebtedness, April 1st, 1887. A few weeks later Mr. Robert J. Livingston sent his check for \$5,000 to encourage us, so that the mortgage now stands at \$8,000. We shall be grateful for special contributions towards relieving the Home from this burden.

As the names of those who have given money for the support of the Home appear on the other pages of this Report, we will only mention at the close of this statement the names of those who have sent various useful and most acceptable articles.

It has been gratifying and encouraging to see the interest which has been shown by deaf-mutes themselves in efforts to sustain the Home by excursions, lectures, amusements, a fair, and membership of the Gallaudet Home for Deaf-Mutes Society.

One of the inmates, having been badly hurt, was received into St. Barnabas Hospital, Poughkeepsie, and gratuitously treated for several weeks. The Trustees are grateful for this kindly act.

Dr. J. M. Cornell and Dr. W. Baxter, of Wappinger's Falls, have kindly treated several of the inmates, and we hereby tender them our sincere thanks for their services.

CERTIFICATE OF INCORPORATION

OF

THE CHURCH MISSION TO DEAF-MUTES

In conformity with the provisions of the Act entitled "An Act for the Incorporation of Benevolent, Charitable, Scientific and Missionary Societies," passed the 12th day of April, 1848, and the several Acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto, the subscribers, of full age, citizens of the United States and of the State of New York, and residents within the City of New York, in said State, being desirous to associate themselves together for the purpose of promoting the temporal and spiritual welfare of adult deaf-mutes, and to be a body politic and corporate for that purpose, do hereby make and sign this certificate:

- 1. The name or title by which said Society shall be known in law shall be "The Church Mission to Deaf-Mutes."
- 2. The particular business and objects of said Society shall be the promoting of the temporal and spiritual welfare of adult deaf-mutes.
- 3. The number of Trustees to manage the said Society shall be twenty-five.
- 4. The names of the Trustees of the said Society for the first year of its existence are: Horatio Potter, John T. Hoffman, D. Colden Murray, Orlando L. Stewart, Isaac H. Holmes, John Carlin, Henry J. Haight, S. R. Comstock, William O. Fitzgerald, Robert Gracie, I. L. Peet, John H. Pool, F. A. Rising, James Ruggles, James McCarter, Charles S. Newell, F. Campbell, James Lewis, Louis F. Therasson, James M. Austin, William Niblo, Frederick DePeyster, Samuel V. Hoffman, Edward M. Curtis, and G. Fersenheim.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

The Church Mission to Deaf-Mutes is a Society designed to promote the temporal and spiritual welfare of adult deaf-mutes. Its central office shall be in the City of New York.

ARTICLE II.

Its members shall consist of those persons paying two dollars and upwards a year towards its support, who shall be elected at any regular meeting of the Trustees. Any person paying one hundred dollars at one time shall be eligible to life membership.

ARTICLE III.

The affairs of the Society shall be under the direction and management of a Board of twenty-five Trustees, to be elected annually, as hereafter provided. The officers of the Society shall be a President, two Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, and a Secretary, who shall be elected annually by the said Board from their own number, and shall also be officers of the said Board.

ARTICLE IV.

The Board of Trustees shall hold stated meetings at least once in three months, and may hold adjourned meetings when necessary. Seven Trustees shall form a quorum for the transaction of business, except that no purchase, lease, or sale of real estate shall be made, unless two-thirds of the whole number shall be present at the meeting at which it is ordered. The Board shall have power to make By-Laws for its own government and for the government of the officers, and to alter and amend the same, and may fill any vacancy which may occur in the Board or among its officers.

Special meetings of the Board and of the Society may be called by the President or one of the Vice-Presidents, or on requisition of five of the Trustees; but when special meetings are called, the time and place of meeting and the subject proposed to be considered shall be previously notified to the members, and no other subject shall be discussed or acted upon at such meetings.

ARTICLE V.

The annual meeting of the Society shall be held in St. Ann's Church for Deaf-Mutes, in the City of New York, on the last Wednesday evening of October. At this meeting the Society shall elect by ballot twenty-five Trustees, who shall hold office for the ensuing year, and until their successors are appointed.

At the first stated meeting of the Board after the annual meeting of the Society, the officers specified in Article III shall be chosen by ballot from

among the members of said Board, and shall continue in office until their successors are appointed.

The Trustees shall present to the Society, at its annual meeting, a report of their proceedings during the previous year, a full statement in relation to the funds and property of the Society, and information relative to the objects of the Society which may be of interest to its members.

ARTICLE VI.

The Constitution shall not be altered unless it be at an annual meeting of the members of the Society, and two-thirds of the members then present consenting thereto, on previous recommendation of the Board of Trustees.

BY-LAWS.

- 1. The President, First and Second Vice-Presidents, Secretary and Treasurer shall faithfully perform the duties usually intrusted to such officers.
- 2. The Trustees shall have power to appoint, by resolution, from time to time, such Special Committees as may be necessary to accomplish most effectually the objects of the Society.
- 3. The Trustees shall appoint a General Manager, whose duty it shall be to take the general oversight of the various departments of work which shall be adopted to improve the temporal and spiritual welfare of adult deaf-mutes. They shall also have power to appoint assistants to the General Manager, and to fix the salaries which shall be paid to the General Manager and assistants.
- 4. The General Manager shall be subject to such regulations as the Trustees may adopt for his guidance, and shall present a written report of his work at every stated meeting of the Trustees.
- 5. With the consent of "The Rector, Church-Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Ann's Church for Deaf-Mutes, in the City of New York," the meetings of the Trustees shall be held in the said church.
- 6. At the meetings of the Trustees, the following shall be the order of proceedings, viz:
 - 1. Devotions.
 - 2. Reading of the minutes.
 - 3. Communication from the officers.
 - 4. Report of the General Manager.
 - 5. Report of Committees.
 - 6. Miscellaneous business.
 - 7. Adjournment.
- 7. Alteration of these By-laws proposed at one meeting can be adopted at the next by a two-thirds vote of the Trustees present, but by unanimous consent at a regular meeting without previous notice.

THIS HOME which was founded December, 1885, by

is admirably situated in the centre of a fine farm of one hundred and fifty-six acres, extending from the turnpike between New Hamburgh and Poughkeepsie, to the banks of the Hudson river.

The Farm is enclosed by a substantial stone wall, and is in a high state of cultivation—its products finding a ready sale in Wappinger's Falls and Poughkeepsie.

On entering the gate from the road, and crossing a creek of never failing pure water, there is seen on a high knoll, the farm-house with its surrounding barns, stables, carriage-house, cattle yard, etc. A broad macadamised avenue, bordered with pines and other trees, forming a shady arch, winds through the farm to the circle at the Mansion. (See Photograph.)

This is a commodious edifice substantially built of stone and brick, with a chapel, library, dining-room, and ample accommodations for fifty people. This handsome building covered with vines, and surrounded by trees, is situated on a high bluff, overlooking the Hudson. The view from the front, over the lawn, and down the river towards Newburgh, the Storm King and Anthony's Nose, is romantic in the extreme, and breathes of peace and rest, from the trials, tribulations, and cares of this world

The bluff on the river, with its valuable limestone quarries, is covered by several acres of woodland. Across the railroad track is an eligible waterfront, with a convenient dock, where supplies can be delivered by boat; and the Railroad Company contemplate establishing a station, within five minutes' walk of the mansion, at Ciinton Point.

In this Retreat, a 'St. Johnland' for deaf mutes, it is proposed to gather the aged and infirm, and such others as may need fostering care after they leave school. It is expected that most of the inmates will be able to work on the farm, or in shops at various trades, thus contributing to the support of the Home. There will be frequent sign services in the chapel, and constant efforts put forth to lead these "children of silence" to believe in Him who said 'EPHPHATHA" to the man that was deaf and had an impediment in his speech.

The object of this Home should be borne in mind, by all who desire that the Deaf Mutes should be made as happy and useful as may be consistent with their great deprivation. It is a Charity that appeals to the generous sympathy of all Christian people. Donations will be gratefully acknowledged by the General Manager
